WINS MEET BY POINT MARGIN

EUGENE, Ore., May 29. (AP)—The University of Oregon track team is back in Eugene today, after winning its first victory of the season yesterday. The Wedfooters handed out the short end of the race to the Oregon Agricultural college track and field men, 66 to 55, at Corvallis.

The dual meet was undecided until Victor Wetzel, of Oregon, hurled the javelin 165 feet for first. The points clinched first place for the Lemon-Yellow athletes. The javelin was next to the last event of the meet.

FRENCH FASTEST
Speed is once more becoming a prominent factor in baseball. With the slugging type games that has been popular for some years, speed lost much of its value. Now that the teams are resorting to strategy, bringing back some of the inside stuff that has been stored away for many seasons, speed once more comes to the front.

In this connection I might add, that I regard Walter French of the Philadelphia Athletics, the fastest man in the American league. There are better base runners because French has yet to master the art of getting a big lead. However, no player in the American, I doubt in the majors, can step to first or circle the bases as fast as French.

The former West Point start athlete runs close to the ground and travels much faster than his style would make you believe.

DISPLAY FAHS
The failure of Display, winner of the Preknock, to finish better than tenth in the Kentucky derby, was a distinct disappointment to turf followers in the east.

The manner in which Display won the historic Preknock made it seem that he had an excellent chance to beat such great horses as Bubbling Over, Hagenbaggare, Pompey and the rest of the classy field.

Display, a had actor at the post, as usual, held up the Derby start, but never was a contender. Only once in turf history has the same horse won both the Derby and Preknock. Back in 1919, Sir Barton turned the trick. It stands as one of the greatest achievements in turfdom.

When two of Bradley's horses, Bubbling Over and Hagenbaggare, finished, one, two, it marked the second time the Bradley thoroughbreds finished that way in the Derby. Back in 1921 Johnny Younger and Black Servant, came under to win and place.

COLLINS BEST
"Kid" Gleason, who has been identified with the big leagues more than two score years, pronounced Eddie Collins as the greatest second baseman of all time. "Lajole was a marvel," says Gleason, "Hornsby is a wonder, but for all-round ability I pick Collins."

FINALS WON BY SWEETSER

MUIR FIELD, May 29. (AP)—Jess Sweetser, of New York, today won the British amateur golf championship defeating Alexander Simpson, of Edinburgh, in the 36 hole final.

The match ended on the 31st green, the score being six up and five to play. Sweetser thus becomes the first native-born American to win the prized British amateur crown.

Sweetser's victory came dramatically on the most picturesque hole of the Muir field course—the long narrow green cut into the edge of a hill and surrounded by a seemingly chain or shell hole bunkers. The hole thirteenth, is only 128 yards long. The hillside about it were massed with spectators who seemed to sense the hopelessness of the Scotchman's situation. Sweetser was downy six and to keep the match alive Simpson had to win the hole.

Yonous exclamations escaped the hillside gallery as the Scotchman sent his tee shot soaring toward the green, seemingly bound on a true line, but it dropped too near a bunker and trickled over the edge into the steep faced cavern. The Scotchman made a heroic effort to save the championship by raising the ball to the green with his niblick. He then holed his putt for a par three.

Sweetser was on the green with his tee shot. He missed his first putt, the ball stopping a foot from the hole, but the third dropped into the cup for a half in three, and a victory in the match at six and five.

Bobby Jones and Francis Ouimet who were eliminated in the tournament fought their way through the throngs to shake Sweetser's hand and embrace him. It was with the greatest difficulty that the American winner made his way to the clubhouse. Photographers barred the way before, and admiring caddies scotch flippers and hats trooped behind.
