## Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)  
Breakfast—Strawberries, cereal, thin cream, eggs in nests, crisp toast, milk, coffee.  
Luncheon—Baked new cabbage, lettuce sandwiches, grape juice, pudding, milk, coffee.  
Dinner—Noodle soup, vegetable loaf with celery sauce, orange and water cress salad, maple custard, macaroni, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

**Grape Juice Pudding**  
One tablespoon granulated gelatine, 1 cup boiling water, 1 lemon, 2 eggs, 1 cup grape juice, 4 tablespoons sugar, 1/2 cup heavy cream, 2 tablespoons powdered sugar, one half teaspoon vanilla.

Soften gelatine in four tablespoons cold water, squeeze from lemon and cut rind in tiny bits. Cook rind in boiling water for ten minutes. Add softened gelatine and stir until dissolved. Cool and add egg well beaten, lemon juice, grape juice and sugar. The sweetness of the grape juice will determine the amount of sugar. Place bowl in a pan of boiling water and beat with a Dover beater until mixture is of the consistency of thick cream. Pour into a mold and chill. Serve with cream whipped and sweetened with vanilla.

## The Garden

Scatter pulverized sheep manure over your flower beds as the June perennials come into bloom. It will show in the extra size and vigor of the plants.

Stake the tomatoes when you set them out. They can go in until the middle of June.

Make succession sowings of beets, lettuce, late peas, beans, and radishes this week.

Use this same dust on cabbage plants and start as soon as the seedlings make two leaves. They are big enough for a young cabbage worm's roost and breakfast.

Save a few gladiolus bulbs, those that have the shortest sprouts, for mid-June planting.

Try some of the new strains of delphiniums. Seed is now on the market and many dealers sell fresh seed in midsummer, which germinates much more readily than last year's crop.

Get in dahlias plants any time this month. Growing plants now on sale are even better than the tubers.
