Stiffer Call Money Restrains Operations

NEW YORK, June 1. (AP)—Stiffening call money rates tended to restrain bullish operations in today's stock market, which advanced briskly at the opening and then tapered into dullness. The lack of extensive public participation after the sustained advance of last week was somewhat of a disappointment to professional traders working for higher prices and reactionary tendencies became more pronounced as the session progressed.

BERRIES FLOOD EARLY MARKET

PORTLAND, Ore., June 1. (AP)—There was a deluge of berries on the early growers market today. Strawberries, raspberries, loganberries and currants. In fact, the arrivals deluged the market building and overflowed into the street. Truck loads, unable to gain admittance, parked along the curb a block away.

When prices on strawberries reached \$2 a crate the growers refused to sell and many loads were taken to the canneries and juice plants after the early season. At the opening growers asked \$2.50 a crate but as the heavy receipts kept pouring in they were forced to lower their prices. Some berries sold at \$2.25 to \$2.50 a crate but the bulk of the fruit went around \$2.25 with quite a few sales at \$2.

Raspberry receipts were the heaviest so far this season and the market broke fully at \$2 a crate. A few early sales were made at \$3 to \$2.25 but the bulk of the fruit went at \$2.25 to \$2, with load lots as low as \$2.50 a crate. Logan Hard to Move. Logans were hard to move and lots were cleaned up at \$2 to \$2.25 a crate. The loganberry crop is coming on heavy and picking will be in full swing this week.

Offerings of currants were limited but there was little demand. Best grades went at \$2.50. Half crate of blackcaps brought \$2. The strawberry deal is nearing the windup. Some of the growers say their patches will be cleaned by the end of this week. Late fields will last another ten days.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 1. (AP)—Not enough country dressed meats arrived on the street this morning to really test values, but considering the scarcity of country hogs and keen demand, fancy pork would probably bring around 21 to 22 1/2 cents. Prices at the yards on live hogs have reached the 17 cent level. A few ordinary country dressed hogs sold today on the street at 20 1/2 cents. Choice light veal is fairly steady at 25 1/2 to 18 cents. Receipts are moderate with a good call for top calves.

An improved tone is showing in the live poultry market. Stocks cleaned up well over the holiday and buyers are after new supplies. Bids on hens ranged from 21c on lights to 26 cents for heavies. Broilers range from 21 cent on white birds to 26c on colored stock. Butter and eggs opened generally steady with a fair demand for both lines after the holiday. No change is shown in prices as there has been no session of the dairy exchange since last Thursday. Board quotations on eggs are: Extras 28c; firsts 27c; mediums 24c and current receipts 26c.

Cube butter ranges as follows: Extras 38 1/2c; standard 38c; prime firsts 37 1/2c; and firsts 36 1/2c. Prints are steady at 41c with the buying price of fats ranging from 29 to 41c.
