

WALLOWA HAS FROST DAMAGE

WALLOWA, Ore. (Special)—Close observation by many farmers reveals the fact that a large amount of damage to growing crops, gardens and fruit was done by the hard freeze of the first of the week. John Couch, a farmer of the Leap section, states that in examining fields of wheat he has found considerable which was hard hit by the freeze, especially in the low flats, where the frost appeared to be the heaviest. Some small tracts were seeded to Federation wheat last fall by a few farmers over the country, as an experiment to ascertain whether this variety of wheat would stand frothing weather. This wheat was badly frosted in a number of instances and will probably result in nearly a total loss on the small plots seeded. The greater part of the winter wheat seeded in this section last fall was 40 fold and is considered one of the hardest of winter wheats.

Farmers feel that the fields which were not headed out at the time of the freeze and were on low ground, probably have escaped damage, however the yield will probably be cut somewhat. Much of the spring seeded grain in both the valley and hill sections was badly frosted, while some of the fields seemed to suffer but little damage.

Some of the farmers in the valley have been busy the past few days getting water onto the frosted fields as they consider this the best thing to do in order that the grain may start growing again.

Gardens in all sections suffered considerable damage. Some potatoes which were planted several weeks ago, and were up in nice shape were frosted to the ground. Alfalfa crops in the valley were also hard hit in many of the fields. Some farmers state they are thinking of cutting the fields soon, in order that the fields may be watered again starting a new crop. Some state they believe they would be able to get two crops of alfalfa yet this season. All hay crops have made a slow growth during the past few weeks, and are small for this season of the year.

BOMB HOME OF STAR WITNESS

BRIDGEWATER, Mass. June 1. (AP)—The home of Samuel Johnston, brother-in-law of Mrs. Simon Johnston, one of the star witnesses for the state in the Raeco-Vanzetti prosecution, was dynamited this morning but Johnston and seven members of his family escaped injury. The house was demolished.

The blast was heard and felt miles away. Although hurled from their beds and severely shaken, members of the Johnston family otherwise were unhurt.

The Johnston home is about a mile from that formerly occupied by Bartolomeo Vanzetti who, with
