Other free-swingers like McManis of St. Louis, Goslin of Washington, Cuyler of Pittsburgh, Hartnett of Chicago and Kelly of New York all were struck out 50 or more times during the season.

A change of pace on the part of the pitcher, which few sluggers can adapt their style to, in part explains the many strikeouts by players who get distance to their drives.

EPSOM, England, June 2 (AP)—Coronach won the derby here today. The winner, a chestnut colt, is owned by Lord Woolavington. W. Singer's bay colt, Lancegave was second and Lord Derby's brown colt, Colorado, was third. Lord Astor's bay colt, Swift, was fourth.

Night of Ceaseless Efforts to Rescue Trio Finds Workers Still Short of Goal

BUTTE, Mont., June 2 (AP)—After a night of ceaseless efforts to rescue three miners trapped by a cave-in on the 1500-foot level of the West Colusa copper mine here yesterday, officials of the Anaconda Copper Mining company today had virtually abandoned all hopes of bringing the men out alive. The three, Stewart Henderson, shift boss; Henry Lettala and Joseph Langner, were buried beneath hundreds of tons of rock when a section of the roof gave way. Rescue crews were still four or five sets from the place where the miners are believed to be entombed. It was stated at the mine.

Work to Continue.
 In spite of the belief that the trapped men could not have survived, work of moving the barrier will be continued until the bodies are recovered, company officials said.

They were caught in the mine shaft when, without warning, a section of the roof caved in, cutting them off from escape. Rescue workers at once began to dig away the debris, and late yesterday afternoon the diggers could hear Lettala urging them on. Lettala said he was pinned beneath heavy timbers, which had saved him being crushed by tons of rock. He said he did not know

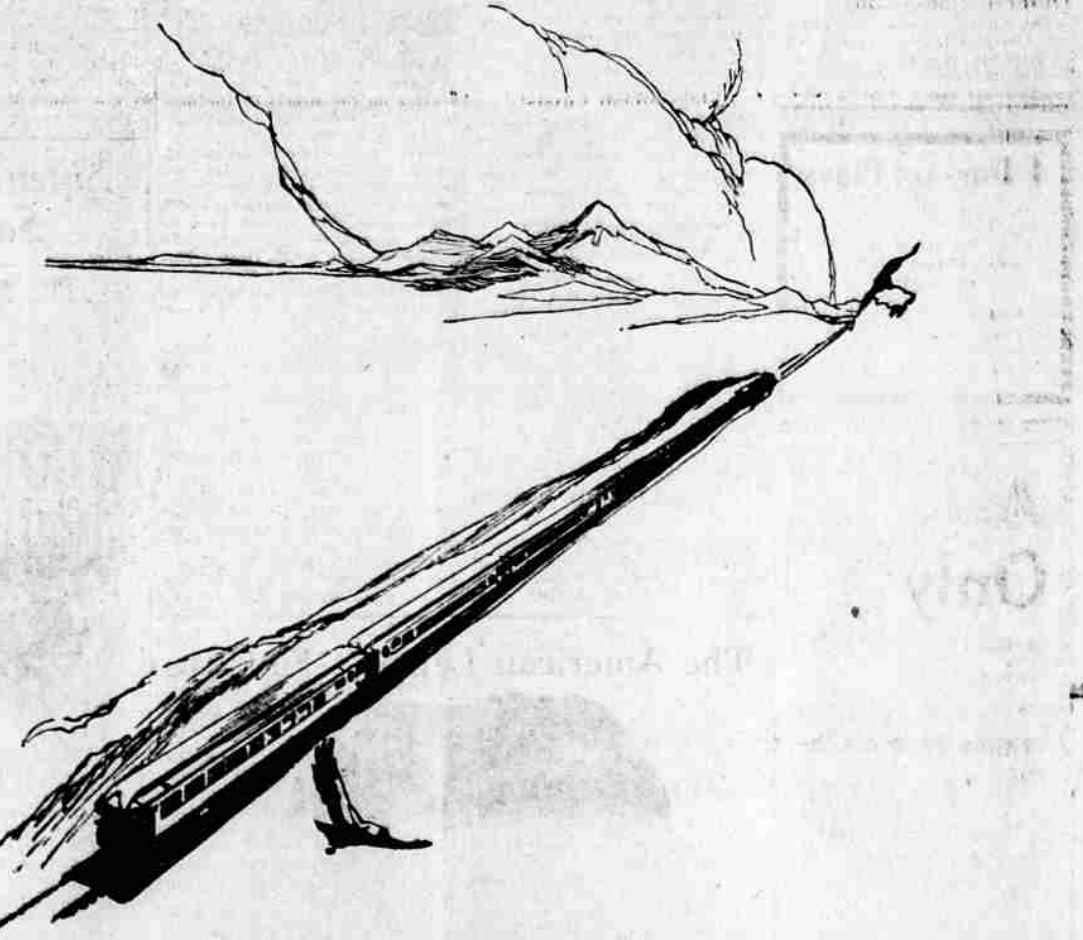
where the other two entombed miners were. Little hope is held that Hutchinson and Langner will be found alive.
 During the night Lettala's voice died away. Rescue workers expect to reach the place where it was heard some time this morning.

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
