The state grange adopted a report of a joint committee of Oregon and Washington granges to study fishing on the Columbia river. The report favored abolition of fish wheels, traps and seines on the Columbia east of Cascade Locks after December 31, 1922. The report also asked that fees on fish gears be equalized.
