Wall Street Closing Strong; Sales Heavy

NEW YORK, June 3. (AP)—Operations for the rice were resumed with increased vigor in today's market. The upward movement embraced practically the entire list, but was particularly sharp in some of the motors and specialties which are believed to harbor an over-extended short interest. Trading showed a substantial increase in volume, total sales crossing 1,100,000 shares before the end of the third hour, with blocks of 1000 to 5000 shares changing hands at frequent intervals.
Over night news was largely constructive in character. The ratification of the French debt agreement by the lower branch of congress, the continuation of record-breaking freight carloadings, and the publication of statistics showing that gasoline consumption in April broke all records and that a substantial reduction had taken place in surplus gasoline stocks all helped to stimulate bullish enthusiasm.
The closing was strong. Total sales approximated 1,750,000 shares.

Country Dressed Hogs In Demand at 21 Cents

PORTLAND, Ore., June 3. (AP)—Meat butchers are paying as high as 21 cents along the street for country dressed hogs and glad to get them. The market is very strong with receipts extremely light. Country dressed calves about steady at 15 1/2 cents the general top.

All lines of live poultry are on a steady basis with values generally unchanged. The moderate arrivals are about sufficient to meet local requirements.

Butter and eggs are steady and unchanged for the day. Receipts of both commodities are liberal but well taken.

Active Buying Urges Wheat Prices Upward

CHICAGO, June 3. (AP)—Active general buying hoisted wheat values today especially in the late dealings. There was a pronounced tendency to reduce estimates of the prospective crop yield southwest, Kansas in particular besides foreign crop reports, were much less optimistic, and there was a marked improvement in European demand for North American wheat. Windpeg noted the best demand in months.

Wheat closed strong, 151 1/2¢ net higher; corn 1 to 2 1/4¢ up; oats at 3 1/4 to 3 1/2¢ and provisions showing 10 to 32¢ advance.
