MORGAN BEATS CHALLENGER

NEW YORK, June 4. (AP)—Tod Morgan, of Seattle, one of pugilism's most recently crowned monarchs, has swept aside the first rounder challenger, Sullivan, at his feet in the sixth. And he has done it so decisively and impressively by a technical knock-out victory over Steve (Kid) Sullivan, of New York, as to be acclaimed today one of the best equipped flat machines now on the throne.

Making his first appearance here since he lifted the 136-pound title from Mike Fullmer last December, Morgan completely outclassed Sullivan, holder of the crown a little more than a year ago. For five rounds the New York boy stood up gamely under the steady fire of the clever Pacific Coast boxer. Then seconds of Sullivan deciding he had absorbed punishment enough, tossed in the towel.

Sullivan Game.
Entering the ring at 137 1/2 pounds, one pound less than his foe, Morgan quickly demonstrated his superiority by flooring Sullivan twice for counts of nine, once in the first round and again in the second. From that point on the match became a display of Morgan's skill and an exhibition of Sullivan's gameness.

Sullivan, gamely carrying on in the sixth, was unwilling to quit when the towel fluttered into the ring from his corner. He continued to flail away at the champion, until Referee Crowley stepped between them, but handlers of the erstwhile king had to drag him to a corner and pin him there to stop the one-sided bout.

Billy Evans Says:

PITCHING SUPREME

Pitching is still paramount in major league baseball.

Speed is once more a prominent factor, due to the less lively ball, and accuracy in the field is most essential, but, after all, the most important feature of the game is pitching.

Washington has a great ball club, but it must get pitching to win. If the veteran members of the twirling staff fail to go the route, the Nationals are sunk.

When the American league champs get good pitching the club looks like the flashiest aggregation in the league.

The Yankees have a powerful punch at the bat. However, if you get six runs and the opposition manages to drug seven tallies across, the punch is wasted.

Ask any big league manager about his prospects and his opinion invariably will be that the club's chances rest with its pitching.

PITCH-HITTERS

Not so many years ago little help at bat was expected from members of a pitching staff.

Times have changed, however, and now many of the best hitters in the major leagues are the pitchers.

Take three of the veteran members of the Washington staff, Walter Johnson, Dutch Reuther and Joe Bush. All are mighty dangerous when swinging the ash.

As a matter of fact, all three have won reputations as pinch-hitters aside from their twirling ability. When Washington needs a good right-hander in the crisis, Johnson and Bush often get the call. Reuther is often the choice when a left-handed hitter is desired.

For years Johnson has played pinch-hitting roles at Washington. The same with Joe Bush when he was with the New York Americans. Reuther first won prestige in that line as a National leaguer. He has continued it in the American.

DRASTIC ACTION

Manager John McGraw of the New York Giants is one manager who refuses to stand pat when his club isn't winning.

McGraw has the courage of his convictions. If he feels a certain swing will help his team, he goes through with it, regardless of how drastic it may seem.

The Giants looked great in spring training. It seemed as if McGraw would get much better pitching. That was one thing he lacked last season.
