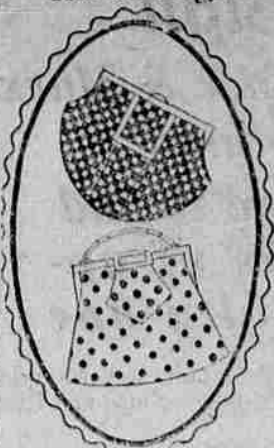

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Charles Brandon Booth Addresses General Federation of Women's Clubs Today

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 4. (AP)—Consecrated individual service alone can meet the dangers of adolescence, Charles Brandon Booth, son of Maude Ballington Booth, today told the General Federation of Women's Clubs.

"The only thing wrong with the children of America is that they are lonely—lonely for you," he declared in portraying the need for extension of big brother and big sister service.

A resolution regretting discrimination against books in the present postal laws was laid over when the question of insurability of books if they were sent at newspaper rates, was raised.

"There is too much news and too little knowledge," said Mrs. S. W. Grier of Pittsburgh in adopting the resolution.

During discussion of delinquency problems yesterday it was announced that Mrs. Mabel Walker Whitebrand, assistant attorney general of the United States, had cancelled her engagement to speak on federal industrial prisons for women because of criticism that she was attempting to use the federation to further the plans of the department of justice in this respect.

The criticism originated at an appropriations committee hearing of congress on the subject of an added appropriation of \$1,700,000 for the projected federal prison at Alderson, West Va., for which an initial appropriation of \$200,000 was authorized.

The added appropriation would provide for three hundred women prisoners in excess of the 200 to be cared for in the original appropriation.

The women of the country do not fear a dry referendum, in the opinion of Mrs. John D. Sherman, president of the General Federation of Women's clubs, which at the biennial convention has placed three million women on record as "unequivocally supporting the eighteenth amendment and the Volstead act," and opposed to any modification.

"If there should be a national referendum, and the women would not fear one, the enforcement campaign would be waged by every individual club in the country." Today, the last of the convention, is dedicated to "the American home department," the keynote of the gathering.

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
