

ELGIN PLANS CELEBRATION

ELGIN, Ore. (Special)—One of the features of Elgin's two day celebration on July 2 and 3 will be a pageant of nations. This unusual feature will be in the big parade on July 3 and at the fair grounds in the costumes of various nations, with the Goddess of Liberty and Uncle Sam representing the United States.

At a meeting of committee chairman in the city hall, the tentative program for the two days was outlined.

The program for Friday, July 2, is outlined as follows:

9:30 a. m., athletic sports.
10:00 a. m., baseball game. Elgin versus a team to be selected.
1:30 p. m., program at the fair grounds, the details of which will be announced later. However, it will include racing and rodeo features, and arrangements are being made for several unusual attractions.

7:30 p. m., dancing and carnival sports.

Saturday, July 3.

9 a. m., pageant of nations parade.
10:30 a. m., patriotic exercises, either in the Elgin city park or at the fair grounds.

12 noon, picnic lunch, free coffee, lemonade and wieners.

1 p. m., detailed program to be announced later.
7:30 p. m., dancing and carnival sports.

It was decided to have the celebration on the second and third in order that Elgin's celebration would not conflict with the celebration of other towns, which will be held on the fourth and fifth. In this way the Elgin people will have an opportunity to attend the celebration in other towns, and other people can have the opportunity of coming to Elgin.
