Dud Houser, captain of the University of Southern California track and field team, is one of the greatest weight men in all athletic history. Houser's specialties are the shotput and discus. He holds the world record in the latter event, with a toss of 128 feet 2 1/2 inches, and has put the leaden pill within a few inches of the late Ralph Hoos's record-smashing performance of 51 feet established many years ago. Farm Pointers

Chicks need plenty of clean fresh water even when they have plenty of skim milk. The skim milk is sufficient as a drink for the chicks for the first few days but after they get older they need the water too.

Incubators are frequently infested with mites when the eggs are transferred into them. If the mites are present in numbers on the premises they get into the incubators and brooders in storage. These pests live for sometime without food and multiply rapidly when they have access to the chicks.

The common black leaf spot of alfalfa in Oregon which speckles the foliage of the plant in the early spring has been particularly abundant in the Willamette valley plantings this year, says H. P. Harsa, plant pathologist of the experiment station. Many growers cut the first crop a little early in order to save the leaves which otherwise would turn yellow and drop off. Sunshine and dry weather which keep the plants dry ordinarily check the disease. Alfalfa is seldom troubled after the first cutting.

When canning vegetables in the home best results come by cooking them under pressure. Green beans are cooked 40 minutes under 10 pounds pressure, or 240 degrees for quarts and 25 minutes for pints, at the O. A. C. horticultural products plant. Greens and spinach are cooked 30 minutes at 240 degrees for quarts, young and tender peas are cooked 50 minutes at 240 degrees. If leafy vegetables are packed too tight in the cans they will spoil. Over filling of the jars prevents heat from penetrating.

An important consideration for success in farm or backyard poultry raising is soil. A light, sandy soil through which water leaches is best adapted for intensive poultry raising. A light loam that will grow good grass is also well adapted for chickens. A heavy clay loam is objectionable because the land does not drain readily and it is more difficult to keep the fowls healthy.

Jolly defeated Joe Stein, American, three and two. Emmett French and E. R. Whitcombe finished all square.

DELEGATES ON WAY TO HOMES

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 5. (AP)—A message that spiritual interest must come first was carried to the four corners of the land today by delegates returning from the 18th biennial convention of the General Federation of Women's Clubs. "Let our spiritual interests come first" was the closing admonition of Mrs. John D. Sherman, president, last night, in instructing the club women of America to educate themselves for mental control, leadership and service rather than for superficial decoration. "Tighten your grip upon today and live it as intensely and sincerely as you can. Have convictions. Learn to take a stand. 'I believe in women. I believe also in men. I have faith in the eventual adjustment in our republic of the troubling differences which temporarily threaten its stability, our mental forces, our physical forces, our loyalty our material blessings, our leadership, our organizations—but most of all of our individual faith and love to the re-establishment and support of the basic principles of our government.' The convention which began on May 24 adjourned last night after an address by Margaret Slatery, of Boston, in which she asserted that the younger generation was not godless but throbbing with emotion.
