FOREST ROAD PROGRAM OUT

Half a Million Dollars of Federal Money Available for Use in Oregon This Year.

Nearly half a million dollars from the federal forest highway fund is available for major forest highways in Oregon during the coming field season according to radio message just received by the District Forester C. M. Granger from Washington, D. C.

Highways to be built under this appropriation are as follows:

The Burns-County line section of the Canyon City-Burns highway, federal highway funds, \$65,000, cooperation by Harney county, \$45,000. The Long Creek-Beech creek section of the Pendleton-John Day highway, federal \$50,000, Grant county, \$25,000, Mount Hood-Wapinitia, federal \$35,000 (including clearing), Wasco county \$25,000, state \$6,000, Flagra-Enterprise highway, six-mile extension, federal \$25,000, Wallowa county \$10,000, Klamath Falls-Lakeview, 2 1/2 miles, federal \$75,000, state \$75,000, Medford-Crater Lake, surfacing, 6 1/2 miles, federal \$50,000. Chapin creek-Spray section of the Heppner-Spray highway, federal \$50,000, Morrow county \$75,000. Dallas-California project (refinancing of going project) federal \$25,000. Maintenance of forest highways, federal \$54,000.

The forest highway fund was first created under the federal highway act of 1921. It is expended in the construction and maintenance of roads of primary importance to state, counties or local communities adjacent to the national forests. This is in addition to the minor road program of the forest service, which is financed from their forest development fund and ten per cent fund appropriations.

Selection of projects under the forest highway fund is jointly determined by the state highway commission, the U. S. bureau of public roads, and the forest service. Engineering and construction is under the supervision of the bureau of public roads. The forest service cooperates in forestry and fire prevention.

BUICK SALES RUNNING HIGH

The delivery of Buick cars to owners continues to run far ahead of shipments, according to factory announcement.

Sales for the first twenty days of May totaled 19,709 units, or 5772 more than shipments for the same period. Cars shipped from the factory during the twenty day period totaled 13,937.

This shipment figure maintains the average of about 20,000 cars shipped per month since the current series was introduced last August.

The sales for May are maintaining the pace set in April, according to E. T. Strong, general sales manager. April deliveries were 7542 cars ahead of shipments. Dealers' stocks are being rapidly reduced by the heavy demand for cars, Strong says.

HEALTH

Good food is more important for the human machine than good gasoline and oil are for your automobile.

Good food is more important for the human machine than good gasoline and oil are for your automobile. Because the human machine furnishes material for growth, repair, and mental action, as well as power for locomotion, good food is essential for physical development, good health, and long life. Physical development includes the proper growth and nourishment of muscles, bones, teeth, nerves, vital organs, ductless glands, and other tissues of the body.

Good health demands good food, properly chewed, digested, and assimilated. Long life demands that good food be eaten in proper amounts at regular intervals.

Food that furnishes growth, repair, and power for physical and mental action must contain fats, vitamins, minerals, carbohydrates (starches and sweets), and proteins. Each is essential to keep the human machine in good order. A diet deficient in either carbohydrates, proteins, fats, vitamins, or minerals is not a well balanced diet. It is absolutely injurious to all; and more seriously affects the young active, growing boy or girl.

When minerals and vitamins are deficient in food—bones, teeth, brain, and other tissues of the body suffer. Deficiency diseases, such as rickets, scurvy, anemia, pellagra, or goitre are pretty apt to develop. In the young the absence of minerals and vitamins results in lessened growth.

Supply the minerals and vitamins in good food and there is normal development and return to health if the extent of damage is not too great.

Any fat or fashion in diet that excludes either minerals, vitamins, fats, carbohydrates, or proteins is injurious—and will produce disease in both young and old.

Fortunately for us a well balanced diet is obtainable easily because most foods contain more than one essential element of a proper diet.

Let milk, butter, and plenty of properly cooked green vegetables supply the minerals and vitamins the body needs. Do not over eat in amount or kind of a particular food. Overeating produces toxic conditions and resultant disease.

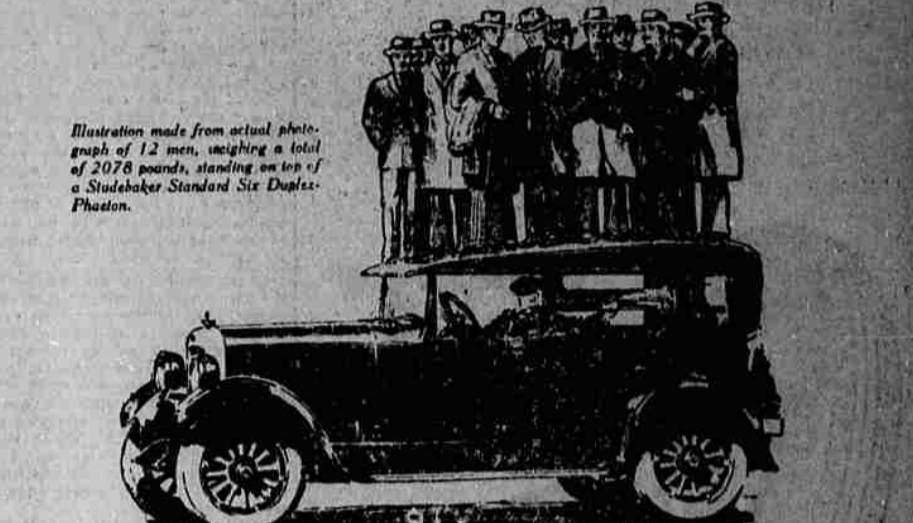
