Sister Mary Says:
 (By Sister Mary)
 Breakfast—Grapefruit juice, cereal, thin cream, scrambled eggs, crisp broiled bacon, crisp bran toast, milk, coffee.
 Luncheon—Baked green cabbage, whole wheat bread, apricot cream pudding, milk, tea.
 Dinner—Pot roast of beef, potatoes cooked with meat, brown gravy, spinach salad, fresh strawberries, mother's spice cake, rye bread, milk, coffee.

If you have an iron kettle with a close-fitting iron cover, the potatoes are placed on top of the meat 1 hour before wanted to serve. The vegetable is really steamed and delicious by this method of cooking. Other vegetables can be added if the family does not object to a "sauvoury" gravy. Salt the vegetables about 15 minutes before serving.

Mother's Spice Cake
 Four eggs, 1/2 cup butter, 1 and one half cups brown sugar, 2 and one half cups flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1 cup milk, few grains salt, 1 teaspoon cinnamon.
 Separate whites of 2 eggs for the frosting. Medium brown sugar is used and should be rolled before measuring.
 Cream butter slowly add sugar beating until mixture is creamy. Stir in a few tablespoons of the flour sifted once. Add 1 whole egg and yolks of 3 well beaten. Mix and stir remaining flour with baking powder, salt and cinnamon.

HEALTH
 (By Samuel Brown, M. D.)
 Member Gorgas Memorial Institute
 June is the month of brides! In this month there will be many new families founded. That they should be founded under proper auspices is all important to the welfare of the race. Linking the diseased with the healthy is building on a foundation of sand, for under such circumstances the new family is starting under a severe handicap.

Many states have passed eugenics laws, which require medical examination of prospective married couples, before marriage licenses will be issued. These laws have strong advocates in all parts of the nation. But such laws may be evaded and will continue to be evaded until the public comes to the consciousness that health should be a foundation stone for every marriage. It is difficult to educate health into a people. It is better to educate the public to the need for health when the teachings of health become an established factor. Regardless of laws, common sense health rules will prevail.

The first step, therefore, for those contemplating matrimony is to have a health audit. Is the man healthy? Is the woman healthy? Perhaps there is some defect which can easily be remedied. If both are healthy, barring throwbacks to previous generations, the children will be healthy and if this process is repeated for several generations a more robust and sturdy race will result.

Assuming the two healthy young people marry, it then becomes a duty not only to each other but to the coming generation that they preserve their health. Economically as well as physically, this is a highly important matter. The ill from preventable disease cost America each year \$1,500,000,000. Part of that is paid for by industry, but most of it is paid for by the families of the nation. The loss of each day's work and each day's pay brings the newly married couple closer to the border line between plenty and want.

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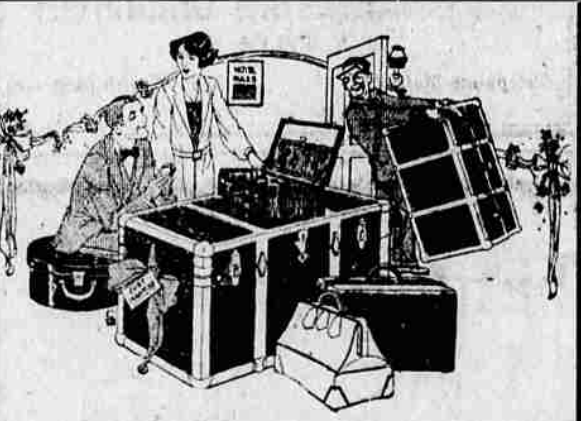
