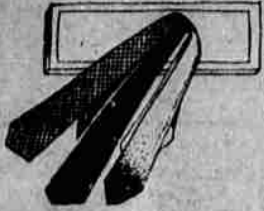

Rail Conferences in New York Are Resumed

NEW YORK, June 8. (AP)—Conferences between officials of the Southern Pacific and the Northern railroads regarding the joint use of new railway facilities in Southern Oregon were resumed today at the Southern Pacific offices but no definite decision was reached at the forenoon session.

Unofficially, it was indicated that substantial progress had been made on the Oregon program but a final agreement probably will be delayed for several weeks. The conferences were interrupted this afternoon when Mr. Budd was called back west on other business. The presidents of both the Northern lines described crop and traffic conditions in their territory as satisfactory and predicted that earnings would be fully as good, if not better, than last year.

U. S. MAKES NO MOVE IN CASE

PARIS, June 8. (AP)—The French foreign office notified the U. S. ministry upon the recommendation of American Ambassador Herriek today that if a sentence of death has already been passed upon Bennett J. Doty, of Memphis, member of the French foreign legion in Syria, it shall not be carried out until all the papers in the case have been referred to Paris.

PARIS, June 8. (AP)—The American embassy up to noon today had made no representation to the French government regarding the case of Bennett J. Doty, of Memphis, Tenn., who under the name of Gilbert Chase is held in Damascus, Syria, on charges of desertion from the French foreign legion and rebellion.

The French foreign office's conducting of the case thus far is limited to what has appeared in the newspapers. Official feeling seems to be that if the court martial sentence Doty to death any appeal from Ambassador Herriek for a commutation will be granted, provided there is time to prevent the execution.

A Damascus dispatch yesterday said Doty would be court martialed as soon as the proper papers could be drawn up, but that this would probably require two days. Doty, fighting with the French in Southern Syria, is alleged to have engaged five other members of the foreign legion. He was taken to Damascus Sunday night under heavy guard.

HOPPERS STRIP PLANTS
REDDING, Cal. (AP)—Hungry grasshoppers are stripping foliage from plants and trees in the vicinity of Red Bluff and Probertus. A crew of men were busy engaged in covering trees in the vicinity with cheese cloth bags.

150-MILE DRIVE TAKEN IN QUEST OF YELLOW CAT

WARREN, Ohio, June 8. (AP)—Two men from Atlanta, Indiana, were on their way home today after a futile 150-mile auto trip here in search of a yellow cat. The men obtained a search warrant here, and with a justice of the peace searched the home of James E. Stillwell, but failed to find the cat. The men said Stillwell, during a visit to Atlanta, had admired the cat, and they thought he had taken it home with him. Stillwell said he had taken only a passing interest, and not the cat. He took the search philosophically.

Curfew Law May Check Metropolitan Cabarets

NEW YORK, June 8. (AP)—Some of New York's cabarets and night clubs are operated by criminals, and for this reason all honest people should be out of such places by 2 o'clock in the morning to prevent their being victimized, Police Commissioner McLaughlin asserted today, in telling why he had put a 2 a. m. curfew into effect in the bright light district.

"We know what has been going on during certain hours in the night clubs," said the commissioner. "And for this reason we decided that 2 o'clock was the hour for all decent people to be out of such places."

Campfire Permits to Be Required June 20

WALLOWA, Ore., June 8.—Beginning June 20, campfire permits will be required on the Wallowa national forest, according to N. J. Billings, forest supervisor.

Permits may be obtained free of charge from the supervisor at Wallowa, from any of the rangers, or from the sheriff's office at Estacada.

HISTORY OF SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 9

feet, and painted it with black paint.

On the day school opened the pupils appeared with all kinds of textbooks that they had brought from their eastern homes. There were 18 pupils of various ages and sexes. Among the pupils were Mandy Glenn, Willard Hinehart, Riley Glenn and Ellen Kuhn. The school house was moved several times to various parts of the district. Finally it was moved to the York place in the seventies, and remained there until 1898. Then it was moved to the present site. Within five or six years another room was added and since then we have employed two teachers, each teacher teaching four grades.

Some of the early teachers were C. L. Blakelock, W. E. Hindman, C. E. Oliver, who later became school superintendent of Lake county, Ore., I. J. Rouse, who later became school superintendent of Union and then Willowa county; I. A. Hinehart, of Salem, Rachel Brooks Bidwell, and H. A. Wilkerson, principal of Greenwood school, La Grande.

In 1918 the ninth grade was voted into our school. Miss Pearl Woods was principal of the school. In 1919, the school was standardized, but it has since deteriorated, the ninth grade dropped. We are sorry to say that it is no longer standard. Our present teachers are Mrs. Hal, principal, and Miss Fries, primary teacher.

The first settlers had some trouble with the Indians, but nothing serious ever happened. The settlers sometimes got scared on account of Indians coming into this district and holding their dances. The farmers sometimes took their guns to the fields in case of Indians. The last scare was in the fall of 1878, when it was reported that the Indians were on the war-path and were going to kill the settlers of Grande Ronde. The settlers of the district assembled with those of Summerville and Dry Creek districts and built a fort at Summerville, and put out guards and had quite a scare, but the Indians did not come.

The first orchard in the district was grown from seed brought from Iowa by E. Kuhn and planted on the Kuhn place. The first gooseberries, raspberries and currants were raised on the W. S. Glenn place, now owned by Elias Johnston.

The road from our school house to La Grande is practically the same route as established in 1862. There is a good market road from Island City to within three miles of our schoolhouse. The remaining three miles are already surveyed and ordered built this year.

The first white child born in this district was Anna Kuhn, daughter of E. Kuhn, born November 27, 1862. The first death was Justice Kuhn, daughter of E. Kuhn. The first doctor was Dr. Dayton. The first sickness was T. T. Glenn. It was typhoid fever, contracted before arriving here. Our school surroundings are said to be the most beautiful in the county.

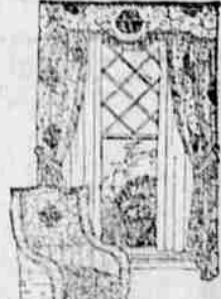
