Cites Failures—Turning on Senator Watson, who was interrupting his analysis of the recent defeats secured by administration supporters in Iowa, Illinois, Pennsylvania, and Oregon, he said the Indiana senator had "been able to squeeze through" the recent primary in that state, but not "by clinging to Cal and standing by Andy."

"The only reason" the others—Cunningham, McKelvey, Pepper and Stanford—were defeated, Senator Harrison held, "was that they clung to Cal and stood by Andy too long."
