U. S. Steel Captains Rally of Stock Prices

NEW YORK, June 9. (AP)—Stock prices rallied sharply this afternoon under the leadership of U. S. Steel common after an earlier period of heaviness. Trading expanded in volume as the upward movement progressed, although at the end of the third hour the day's total was about 200,000 shares below that of yesterday. Closing was firm. Total sales approximated 2,500,000 shares.

EGG PRICES CLIMB TODAY

PORTLAND, Ore., June 9. (AP)—Fresh egg values are climbing in the local market. Offers on the exchange range from a half to 2c higher for the day, with extras showing the greatest gain.

Fresh standard extras are now up to the 21c level with firsts and mediums a cent higher at 20c and 26 cents respectively. Current receipts gained another half cent and are now posted at the 27 cent level.

Lighter receipts and higher values in other areas are the principal bullish factors. Receipts in the local market yesterday were reported at 95% cases with 27% finding their way into the cooler.

Storage stocks in Portland total 48,778 cases on Monday as compared to 72,123 cases for the same week last year. Smaller cooler stocks also show some influence in values at this time. Holdings here increased 2,119 cases during the past week.

Holdings for the entire coast are now well upward compared to a year ago, a total of 452,595 cases comparing with 362,115 cases at this time in 1925. Coast stocks increased 24,164 cases during the past week.

Mr. Weston, who is 88, was poorly clad, and unable to explain his presence to a patrolman, who found him.

Parents Reclaim Baby From Garage Owner

HEALERSBURG, Cal., June 9. (AP)—The six-month-old baby boy that was left by a mysterious young couple with James Masante, garage man, Sunday night, in exchange for a couple of tires, was claimed by its parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Murray, of Fort Bragg, last night.

The Murrays explained to the authorities that they had left the baby with Masante because they dreaded the effects of the long cold drive to Fort Bragg, 100 miles distant, on the lot, and they had explained all this to the garage man.

Pinchot Spent \$154,000 Senate Committee Hears

WASHINGTON, June 9. (AP)—Governor Pinchot told the senate committee (and committee today he and his state wide organization had contributed something over \$154,000 to his unsuccessful senatorial campaign against Senator Pepper and Representative Vane.

Pennsylvania's recent three way republican senatorial primary, in which Representative Vane emerged victor over Senator Pepper and Governor Pinchot, came under the eye of a special senate investigating committee when it started a general inquiry into senatorial campaign expenditures of 1926.

Candidate and political managers from the Keystone state were present in force to tell their respective stories.

FOREST FIRE IS QUENCHED

MEDFORD, Ore., June 9. (AP)—After 46,000 acres of brush and timber land had been burned over, a forest fire which had been raging in the Siskiyou mountains in Oregon and northern California, was brought under control yesterday afternoon. Approximately 68 sections of forest were ravaged, 3500 acres of which was in this state. Two more fires are reported to be near Holt and Hornbrook, Cal. To fight the Hornbrook blaze, a deputy sheriff and a forest ranger at that place stopped many motorists to enlist them for fire fighting. It was reported here today.

ESTABLISH STAGE SERVICE
SALISBURY, Ore., June 9. (AP)—Stage service will be established by the Oregon Electric Railway company from Woodburn to St. Paul by way of West Woodburn on June 14 the company announced today in a letter to the public service commission. Two or three round trips will be made daily. The service will take the place of the train service which is being removed between Woodburn and West Woodburn.

MEDFORD, Ore., June 9. (AP)—Suffering from heart trouble, and said to have been dependent, E. E. Brennan, 48, of Gladstone, Ore., committed suicide here early this morning near the Southern Pacific freight depot by firing a bullet through his heart. He was here for three months past and at noon today was identified by a cousin, George Kuehman.

Kansas Wheat Going Higher Despite Rain

CHICAGO, June 9. (AP)—Despite rain in Kansas wheat prices averaged higher today, owing to bullish private crop reports from parts of Kansas and Nebraska. Profit taking and evening up transactions to prepare for the government crop report due after the close acted as an offset to a large extent to the buying, and prices held within relatively narrow limits. Unofficial reports from spring wheat territory were less optimistic with heavy demands which were noted in districts of South Dakota and Minnesota.

ISHII STARTS LEAGUE SCRAP

GENEVA, June 9. (AP)—The crowd which packed the league of nations council chamber today in the hope of lively incidents growing out of the council was not disappointed.

Just before the adjournment of the public meeting, President Guani announced that it had been decided to discuss the reorganization of the council in public instead of private session.

Dr. Mello Franco, of Brazil, and the secretary of the Spanish legation at Bern, who were present, made no move. But Vincent Ishii caused a stir by insisting that in private or at least adjourned.

"An adjournment if you will," interjected Sir Austen Chamberlain, British foreign secretary, rather apocryphally "but I cannot consent to this matter being treated in a private meeting."

Dr. Mello Franco, Brazil's representative who absented himself from the opening meeting of the league of nations council, took his seat at the conference table when today's session began.

Thus in an affirmative manner did the Brazilian diplomat solve the burning question: "Will he come?" His absence on Monday was explained as due to illness, but it was remarked at the time that he appointed no substitute, from among the members of his delegation.

PORTLAND GROUP VISIT WALLOWA COUNTY JUNE 22

Motoring to Eastern Oregon to inspect the Unatilla project and to visit the McKay Creek dam and reservoir, a group of members of the Portland and Oregon State chamber of commerce will continue the trip to La Grande Tuesday, June 22, for a visit to Wallowa county as far as Enterprise, according to word received here by the Union county chamber of commerce.

The committee visited the Grande Ronde valley two years ago and wants to extend the inspection into the neighboring county, the spokesman said.

In honor of the visitors and in order to hear their impressions of the Eastern Oregon country, the usual forum luncheon will be postponed until evening, where a dinner meeting will be held at the Foley hotel.

WHEAT YIELD NORMAL. HARVESTERS GET RAISE.

PENDLETON, June 9. (AP)—The past two hot days have done some material damage to the wheat of Unatilla county, according to County Agent Fred Bennington, but he states that the greater damage was done during the hot spell of April. Mr. Bennington estimated the wheat yield this year at 5,500,000 bushels, which is a normal yield. He states that the seven million estimate earlier in the year by some was altogether too high. Hot winds before harvest time now are the only damage to the wheat crop.

PENDLETON, June 9. (AP)—An increase of from 50 cents to \$1 in the minimum wage scale for harvest hands in Morrow, Gilliam, Sherman and Wasco counties was agreed upon at Arlington yesterday by a group of farm representatives who met with W. C. Carpenter of the Spokane federal employment bureau.

The Unatilla wage scale will be set at a meeting of the Unatilla county farmers' bureau next week. The wages range from \$2 to \$4.

GATES, Ore., June 9. (AP)—George Oakley, a miner, was discovered in his cabin near Quartzville lying at the point of death just five weeks after he had received a broken leg while working in his mine. Oakley was unable to reach a spring and obtained his drinking water from rain water. Supplies in the cabin were exhausted when he was found. Quartzville is located about 25 miles back in the mountains and is reached by trail. The injured man has not yet been brought to a hospital.

FOREST GROVE, Ore., June 9. (AP)—Having been cleared of any connection with the dynamite explosion which Sunday wrecked the house in which his divorced wife was staying here, Perry Cane, was free today. Cane, who had been held for investigation established an alibi in proving that he was at a party four miles away when the explosion occurred. Officers are investigating other leads in the case.
