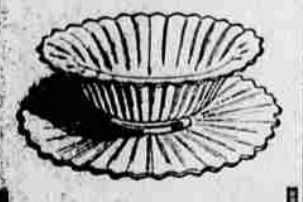

(By Sister Mary)  
 Breakfast — Unbaked strawberries, cereal, thin cream, savory scrambled eggs, crisp graham toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon — Tomatoes stuffed with spinach, white bread and butter sandwiches, chocolate rice pudding, milk, tea.

Dinner — Broiled lamb chops, new potatoes in cream sauce, buttered carrots and peas, Swiss chard salad, cherry pudding, milk, coffee, whole wheat bread.

Needless to say young children will not indulge in the new potatoes nor cherry pudding suggested in the dinner menu. A cooky might be provided to "help the milk go down."

Chocolate rice pudding is a nourishing dessert for young and old.

**Chocolate Rice Pudding**  
 One-fourth cup rice, 2 cups milk, 1 square chocolate, 5 tablespoons sugar, 1 tablespoon butter, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 egg, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.

Wash rice, put chocolate in top of double boiler over hot water and melt. Add milk slowly, stirring constantly. Stir in rice and sugar and salt. Cook over hot water, stirring frequently with a fork until the rice is tender and the mixture is of the consistency of thick cream. Stir in egg well beaten and cook five minutes longer. Let cool and stir in vanilla. Pour into individual glasses, chill and serve garnished with whipped cream.

## Republicans Disagree Over Colonel Brookhart

**Iowans Debate in Reference to Reading Senatorial Nominee Out of Party Again**

DES MOINES, June 11. (AP)—The republican state committee which disowned Colonel Smith W. Brookhart as the party's nominee for the U. S. senate from Iowa, in 1924, faces again the biennial problem of his presence as its standard bearer.

Members of the committee, gathering for a meeting tomorrow to outline a platform for the state convention in mid-July and to survey returns on the primary where-in Brookhart defeated Senator A. B. Cummins by 71,000 votes were under pressure to disavow again the aggressive colonel, while other party leaders advised the committee to acknowledge Brookhart's republicanism on whatever terms it can make.

**To Enter Capital**  
 Brookhart, meanwhile oblivious as always to activities of the party's governing body, neared Washington as an unofficial expedition on behalf of the farmer relief and his associates here gave no sign that they will try at the state convention to gain control of the organization.

The committee must determine whether it will compromise with Brookhart, who never has recognized his right to oppose him, or whether it will disown him again and support an independent candidate or the democratic nominee.

Brookhart had the nominal support of the state committee in 1922, after his first nomination, although a substantial bloc of republicans endorsed his democratic opponent. In 1924, when Brookhart assailed Chas. G. Dawes, as republican vice presidential nominee and campaigned for La Follette, the state committee read him

out of the party and urged support of Dan F. Steck his democratic adversary, who successfully challenged Brookhart's election after a close vote and was seated.

The likeliest chance of reconciliation between Brookhart and party leaders, several of them pointed out, lies in advocacy by both of definite steps for farm relief. The candidate and the organization are close together in their views on the need of legislation, although Brookhart has gone further than his party in his demands.
