TWO SLAIN IN TRAIN WRECK

NORFOLK, Va. June 11. (AP)—The locomotive, small car, baggage car and two passenger coaches of a Norfolk Southern passenger train topped off a trestle 24 miles west of Washington, N. C. early today, killing the engineer and fireman and injuring a postal employee and a porter.
The Pullman of the train was the only coach to remain on the rails, although one passenger coach just ahead of it was only partially derailed.
Engineer J. H. Slade and fireman Wm. Huntington, both of Norfolk, were killed. The cause of the accident has not been determined and officials are endeavoring to discover whether the bridge was weakened by a fire or whether a blaze there was started by fire from the wrecked locomotive. The structure was about 15 feet high.

NEW YORK, June 11. (AP)—Commodore Arthur Curtis James, capitalist, yachtsman and society leader, has become the largest single owner of railroad property in the country with his acquisition of a large block of Western Pacific stock. It is said in Wall street.

Mr. James already was one of the principal owners of the Northern Pacific and the Great Northern railroads and through them, owns the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy, and he is popularly credited with ownership of the largest single block of stock in the Southern Pacific. His holdings in this group make him a factor in over forty thousand miles of western railways, and he is known to have smaller interests in other railroads.

Chain Stores Forced Into Bankruptcy Today NEW YORK, June 11. (AP)—An involuntary petition in bankruptcy was filed today in the United States district court against the R. A. Pilsner company, a Delaware corporation, which had offices in this city, which operates a chain of stores in California, Oregon and the state of Washington. No estimates of assets or liabilities accompanied the petition, in which it is alleged upon information and belief that the concern had committed acts of bankruptcy by "transferring certain property to diverse creditors."

GUN FIGHT CLIMAXES MOON SALE

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during a liquor raid. He claimed the shooting was accidental.

SALEM, Ore., June 11. (AP)—John Kaboris is dead and James Angelus is believed to be seriously wounded, the result of a gun fight at an early hour this morning between state prohibition agents and alleged moonshiners at Broadview in north Marion county. Kaboris was killed by Officer C. C. McBride. Bill Brown, on whose farm the men were operating, is in the Marion county jail. Angelus, the wounded man, and his brother, Chris Angelus, escaped from the officers. The Angelus brothers are Greeks. Kaboris also was a Greek.

McBride had been negotiating with Brown, it is claimed, for some time in an effort to trap the gang. Late Thursday he succeeded in making a deal and secured 84 gallons of moonshine, which was loaded into a truck. While the transaction was being made the other officers, C. E. Hill, H. D. Carter, E. Oaks and Claude Heikman, remained hidden.

After the delivery and sale were completed McBride placed Brown under arrest and handcuffed him. Brown shouted in Greek and the companions began shooting from a barn. McBride drove his gun

and ran shooting as he went, toward the barn. Kaboris, with a gun in his hand, the officers say, stepped from the barn to meet McBride and was killed by the officer. The Angelus brothers succeeded in escaping, one of them, believed to be James Angelus, leaving a pool of blood in the barn. He is believed to be in the St. Paul district.
