RAIN REPORTS BOOST PRICES

CHICAGO, June 11. (AP)—Wheat advanced today in the last part of the board of trade session, influenced by reports that soaking rains are still badly needed in the Northwest despite some drizzle relief last night and this morning. Foreign crop reports were unfavorable with the official German report showing both wheat and rye in poorer condition than last year and with advice that the French government will probably suspend the wheat import duty. Export demand was better today with European purchasing estimated at 7,000,000 bushels.

Wheat closed firm 1/2¢ to 1 1/4¢ net higher; corn 1/2¢ to 3/4¢ up, oats at 1 1/2¢ to 1 3/4¢ advance and provisions unchanged to 20¢ down.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 11. (AP)—Federal State Market News Service—Stocks of apples in city cold storage totaled 29,111 boxes on June 10 against 24,748 boxes on June 10. Storage apples have not been moving rapidly into consumption channels due largely to the liberal supply of many other fresh fruits on the market and also to the inferiority of the majority of apples in storage. One year ago the storage apples amounted to 14,949 boxes.

WOOL REPORT
BOSTON, June 11. (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say:

"There is a brisker movement in wool, both to the worsted mills and the woolen mills, which has been augmented by a big export movement. Prices are not greatly changed and some quotations may be a bit lower as compared with a week ago, but the sentiment in the trade as the week ends is better than for some time. Buying in the west has continued moderately and no one seems disposed to hurry matters at all, reflecting the slow demand for goods and clothing which even now persists although the outlook just now seems more hopeful."

"London showed a slight easing on the finer wools towards the close of the colonial series, prices being generally par to five points below of the resumption rates on June 1. Liverpool East India sales have been very steady and better white wools have shown a slight upward tendency."

"Mohair is very firm. The rail and water shipments of wool from Boston from January 1, 1926 to June 10, 1926 inclusive, were 87,065,000 pounds against 73,535,000 pounds for the same period last year. The receipts from January 1, 1926 to June 10, 1926 inclusive, were 181,612,657 pounds against 137,955,100 pounds for the same period last year."

Prices Are Generally Steady in Portland
PORTLAND, Ore., June 11. (AP)—Not much change is shown in the local produce markets and prices are generally steady. New crops of fruit and vegetables are coming in now both from local fields and from California and there is a generous supply of fresh offerings on the market.

In the dairy list butter and eggs are again posted steady at former levels on the exchange. Top grades of cube butter rule unchanged at 25 1/2 cents and fresh standard eggs steady at the 31 cent level. Receipts yesterday amounted to 1400 cases of eggs and 31,469 pounds of butter besides a local make of 24,344 pounds.

Country dressed meats are unchanged with calves sufficient for local requirements at 14 1/2 to 15 cents for the best. Receipts of country dressed hogs remain light and the market holds at the 21 cent top.

Outside of a plentiful supply of white broilers the live poultry market is steady, with prices well maintained. Light broilers are dragging at 18 to 20 cents. Colored broilers however are in demand at 26 to 27 cents. Hens range from 21c on lights to 27c for heavies.

Constructive Forces Busy in Wall Street
NEW YORK, June 11. (AP)—Constructive forces were again at work in today's stock market, which gave an impressive demonstration strength after an opening period of irregularity. One of the most significant features of the session was the fact that the main body of stocks showed a more general tendency to follow the rise in the market leaders. As a result trading increased in breadth and volume the million share market being crossed before the end of the third hour.

The closing was strong. Total sales approximated 1,600,000 shares.
