Discovery of Old Manuscript Enlightens World on Josephus

The discovery not long ago of the manuscript of the Antiquities of the Jews, written in the ancient church language of the Syriacs, has gone far to solve the long-pondered problem of Josephus, according to the Rev. Oliver Riley, rector of St. Peter's Episcopal church, who embodied the following comments on the finding of the writings in a sermon he preached recently.

"Josephus, in common with all educated Jews of his time, was bilingual, writing and speaking both Aramaic and Greek.

"Josephus wrote the first version of his war—that is, the Jewish war—in the language of his own people; afterward he translated it into Greek. Up to the present, his version for the barbarians, as he called the natives, had been thought lost.

"We have the Greek version which was made for the eyes of the Romans.

"Now a Jewish writer in those days had to be as polite to the men who followed the Eagles as a com-patriot of his had to be to a pope in the Middle Ages; and Josephus was something of a sycophant. So when Josephus turned his Aramaic book into Greek, he may have thought it best to extinguish Jesus Christ by omission. Whether ig-

norance or deliberate neglect on the part of his translators, whether, as alleged, interpolation of his text or his own dropping of a full or original, only the discovery of fresh literary evidence could settle.

"The problem of Josephus has to some extent been solved by the discovery of the manuscript of the Antiquities and the Jewish war in the ancient church language of the Syriacs. The Syriac monks were in Syria in the very early ages of the church, and were familiar with the Aramaic language. Their translation was direct from the original and uncorrupted by Graeco-Roman influences.

"In this text of the Jewish war several references are made to Jesus, from which we may select four. Josephus tells us:

"First, that he knows all about the trial of Jesus before Pilate;

"Second, that in the time of the Emperor Claudius and of the procurator Cuspius Fadus and Tiberius Alexander, many were 'slaves of the wonderworker Jesus.'

"Third, that these preached that their rabbi who died was risen from the dead, and as well they taught the new law that is in opposition to the old Jewish law.

"Fourth, that these very early messengers of Jesus were teaching others who and what he was and is by the help of the primitive documentary mode which he had inspired and all his first messengers had used.

"The importance of these essentials of his testimony cannot be overestimated. Others will appear as investigation goes on, and as the text of the Antiquities is brought into comparison with that of the War.

"It means very much that Josephus knew about the trial of Jesus; it means much more that he should touch on facts and beliefs concerning him as risen from the dead. It is, however, of surpassing value that he could indicate the documentary resources of the preaching of these 'slaves of Christ.' For we are only just beginning to understand how these testimonies sprang from the Lord's own way of explaining himself to simple men and women, and became the mode of teaching him both to Jews and Greeks and Romans so that the old worlds they belonged to were turned upside down."

Cove Church School Will Open Monday

Sixty Episcopalians Are Registered for Religious Institute at Little Historic Church.

Sixty Episcopalians from Eastern Oregon—the full number that can be accommodated—have registered with Bishop W. P. Remington at Pendleton for the third Eastern Oregon summer school for church workers which will open Monday at the Ascension church at Cove, and continue until June 25.

"For Common Joy and Benefit" is the way the program expresses the purpose of the institute. The bishop has promised a banner as a prize to the church best represented.

The course of study includes Bible narratives and principles, conferences for young people on problems of life and church craftsmanhood, child psychology and how to teach, kindergarten and primary methods, principles of Christian nurture, church school administration, story telling, church administration and organization, and mission conduct for clergy.

Some notable Episcopalians will compose the faculty. Besides the Rt. Rev. Remington, there will be: The Very Rev. H. H. Powell, dean of the Church Divinity School, San Francisco; the Rev. Schuyler Pratt, of Hood River; Miss Mabel Lee Cooper, of New York, secretary for the teacher training national department of religious education; Mrs. Annie H. Brown, of Boston, Mass., field secretary for the Massachusetts department of religious education; the Rev. Joseph A. TenBroeck, of The Dalles, associate secretary of the national field department; and Miss Charlotte L. Brown, Pendleton, educational secretary of C. W. S. L.

For the young people's conference, there will be the Rev. Francis H. Hall, of Bend; the Rev. William M. Bradner, of Cove and Union, and the Rev. Sumner J. Brown, of Prairie City and Canyon City.

Miss M. S. Robertson, of Pendleton, will act as registrar and treasurer. Recreation and pageantry will be in charge of the Rev. L. G. H. Williams. "The Venerable W. C. Crosey, archdeacon, of Pendleton, will function in the department of inspection and first aid. Mrs. C. H. Marsh, of Pendleton, will be commissary general.

Although the school opens with a 6 o'clock dinner Monday evening, thereafter the day will begin with a holy communion service in the historic Little Ascension church.

The Garden

After the midsummer flowers have passed their best days and before the fall display of dahlias, perennial asters, sunflowers, helianthus and chrysanthemums, the midday of the garden for color is in the blaze of color equalled only by the May-flowering tulips. It also offers a gorgeous prelude to the glories of the modern race of dahlias which will burst into bloom in September.

June-planted gladioli will come into bloom in September and give a magnificent display. They are even more welcome at this later date than earlier in the season when they have keener competition. These bulbs can be planted to good advantage at intervals until July.

Give them a good depth, six inches, inness the soil is heavy and see that the soil is kept stirred about them. Planted deeply it is not necessary to supply stakes to hold the heavy spikes.

The dainty primulid class becoming a favorite with its delicate shades from cream to scarlet through a great variety of yellow, oranges, pinks and salmons. Rather than small-flowered in its earlier types it now has been brought into the giant-flowering class by the hybridizers, although some experts still maintain that the smaller-flowered forms are the finer and more graceful.

It is the hardest and most easily grown of all the gladioli and the most prolific. Each bulb produces quantities of bulbets which can be sown like peas the following spring and a fine supply ready. Some of them bloom the reason they are planted.

To grow exhibition spikes of gladioli for the summer flower shows give the bulbs a foot apart in soil heavily enriched. Keep them well cultivated and when the bud stalk begins to show give weekly applications of liquid manure made by using pulverized sewage manure. Do not make the application too strong—weak and often is the best motto.
