pecuity of farm property; commends income and inheritance taxes, reducing taxation of property and asks amendment to prevent evasion; condemns reduction by last congress to reduce millionaires taxes and leave burden on small producers; ask abolition of nuisance taxes and demands complete publicity of federal tax returns.

The platform also contains planks on agriculture and labor; transportation; highways; industry and commerce; conservation; public health; education; soldiers and sailors compensation and care; popular government which includes election of president and vice president by popular vote; popular sovereignty which praises Wisconsin representatives in congress for refusing to betray principles in return for patronage and committee assignment; Newberryism and campaign expenditures, declaring that United States senate seats shall not be sold to highest bidder; sectional government, declaring west and national government should be free from domination by eastern industries and financial interests; administration and law denouncing unwarranted trespassing upon the rights of individuals.

The young girl was in charge of a fruit stand on the highway in Polk county when Russell stopped at the place. The girl's father heard her call and arrived at the stand just as Russell had gotten into his car and was driving away. Delapp jumped upon the running board and struck Russell, and Russell kicked him off and escaped. His car carried a Nebraska license number which Delapp copied. The girl was not injured.

Yesterday Delapp was driving in Salem with his wife when he again saw the Nebraska number, and he started in pursuit. Russell tried to get away and a spirited chase took place through the city. As they passed the police station Mrs. Delapp called for an officer, and Officer Warren Edwards joined in the chase. Delapp, however, had overhauled the fugitive by the time the officer arrived and had overpowered him. He was about to administer a thrashing to his prisoner, but was dissuaded by the officer.
