City of Naples Crew

Rescue Still Held Up

TOKYO, June 16. (AP)—Rescue of the crew of the British freighter city of Naples, which went aground yesterday near Miyake island, was still impossible late this afternoon owing to continued high seas and gales, says a wireless message from the Japanese destroyer Urakasa.

The destroyer and the Japanese steamer Chefoo Maru have been standing by to attempt to take the city of Naples crew of about sixty. The Chefoo late today tried to fire a life line to the disabled ship but failed. Similar efforts are continuing.

The freighter was en route from Yokohama to Kobe.
