Farm Pointers

TILING MAY AID ORCHARD

Unthrifty conditions in fruit trees in Oregon including dying of branch tips, failure to produce crops, and a sickly appearance in general, are sometimes due to poor drainage. If the water level is above the root system this condition exists, as the small feeder-roots can not live.

Some orchards including cherry and pear having good heavy soilage, do not produce even though good pollination and all plant food elements necessary are provided, according to experiment station recommendations. To insure proper planning and laying of the system a reliable drainage engineer is consulted, for the cause of this unhealthy condition is often

poor drainage which is remedied by tiling.

Warm, well lighted and well ventilated stables are essential to a high rate of production, says the Oregon experiment station. A sanitary barn has four to six square feet of window space for each cow. When cows are kept in the stalls most of the time, the barn is light enough to read in. Good ventilation is essential, but needs such arrangement that the cows are not exposed to draughts.

Cherries picked too green result in an inferior Oregon product and cut down on the possible tonnage of the trees, reports the college experiment station. If left to ripen properly their weight is increased and the public is better satisfied. Cooperation with the field can of the cannery as to the time of picking rights this problem, for every cannery strives to produce a superior product.

Bracing Oregon fruit trees with

small iron rods is a simple and effective method of preventing heavily loaded trees from splitting at the crotch, the experiment station has found. Holes are bored through main limbs on opposite sides, a short distance above the crotch, and one-half inch rods are driven in and clinched, causing the limb on one side to hold up the one on the other side. The trees soon grow over the ends of the rods, resulting in a permanent brace.

Delco Light to Spend \$20,000,000 on Addition

DAYTON, Ohio, June 17. (AP)—Immediate construction of a \$20,000,000 factory addition, one mile long at Moraine City, near here by the Delco Light company, was announced today. It is the first step in a contemplated \$100,000,000 expansion program which company officials say is due to newspaper advertising.

Airplane Forest Patrol To Start in Few Days

EUGENE, Ore., June 17. (AP)—The airplane forest patrol will be started within a few days, according to H. C. Miller, lieutenant in the army reserves, who will be senior officer in charge of the patrol base here. Lieutenant Miller arrived from Portland yesterday and took charge at the municipal aviation field where the planes will be stationed.

Film Shows World How News Reaches Streets

Pictures Entire Story From Source to Newspaper Reader—Automatic Printers Seen.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 17 (AP)—The manner in which a great catastrophe or other stirring event engaging widespread public attention is brought to the streets and the homes of the world with incredible speed through the agencies of the Associated Press is shown in a special Pathe news film called "The Romance of the News," which is to start a week's run at the California theater here next Saturday. Later the film will be shown in many of the leading theaters of the coast.

The film is the epic of news gathering. It shows first how news was transported by slow sailing vessels, carrier pigeons and railway trains of the vintage of 1840. Then comes the modern showing through the lightning swift instrumentalities of the Associated Press and the newspaper.

An eruption of Mount Vesuvius was taken as an example of a news "story." The volcano is seen belching black smoke and lava, and the lava masses are seen moving on and through ancient Pompeii. The Associated Press correspondent sends a bulletin of the disaster from Naples. It is shown being recorded on a special receiving instrument in New York, much as a record is made on a seismograph.

Telegraphers Relay News. A moment later it comes out as a typed news item and is handed to the operators of the Morse telegraph keys and the automatic printers seated at a specially arranged table. A battery of operators is shown sending, and it is explained that the printers, operated like typewriters, transmit the story to 500 papers instantaneously. It is shown the newspaper office receiving the story. A copy desk man writes a head and the story is shot to the composing room through a tube. The compositor is seen placing the "scare-head" and the giant press is next shown printing, folding and cutting the papers and lifting them in a steady stream virtually into arms of the newsboys.

Takes 25 Minutes. The whole process takes but 25 minutes including the time that the first dispatch is sent until the first customer buys his paper on the streets of an American city. The film shows the swift, smoothly working agencies of news gathering and distribution to the public eye for the first time, and the picture of this tremendous human effort is as thrilling as a picture of the eruption itself.

Sidelights Of Wreck

Editor's Note—Following are a few word sketches of the Pennsylvania train wreck which resulted in 11 deaths and a score injuries last night.

(By the Associated Press) Passengers who escaped with slight hurts told of the wild scenes attending the wreck. The moans of the dying and the terrified screams of the injured pinned in the debris added to the confusion. Those who were able to do so struggled from the Pullmans which while not wrecked, were thrown from the rails. Most of them were in night clothes. The only lights available were in the dim lanterns of the railroad men.

Cool heads among railroaders and passengers brought some semblance of order. Men were sent afoot to Blairsville intersection to summon aid. Those who remained at the scene tried to aid the sufferers trapped in the twisted wreck. But the strength of the human could not combat the steel of the sleepers. Three rescuers succeeded in bringing out only a few of the victims their work being hampered by the lack of light and working equipment.

Reports of the disaster filed in general railroad headquarters here very slowly, due to the fact that the nearest telephone was in Blairsville intersection, several miles away.

Railroad officials and newspaper men at the scene made efforts to identify the dead as the bodies were brought from the cars, but in most cases this was impossible, for there was nothing on the victims to indicate their identity. In some instances where the victims had not undressed, cards and other articles found in the clothing established their identity.

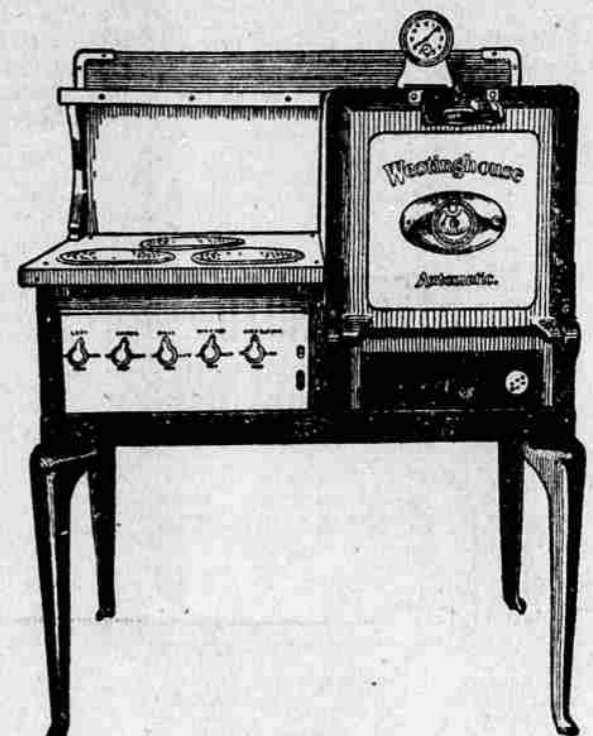
