ALTROCK'S HUMOR

It doesn't always pay to be too serious in sport. Take the case of our old friend Nick Altrock, for instance. Back in 1906, smiling Nick, rated one of the very best southpaws in the majors, received in the neighborhood of \$4,000 for his services. Today, Nick Altrock, as a member of the team of baseball comedians of Altrock and Schuch, receives much in excess of that amount.

When Altrock's arm went back on him, he turned from the serious profession of winning ball games as a pitcher to clowning, and got away with it. Fortunate in possession of a keen sense of humor, Nick was even able to get a laugh out of his passing from the game as an active player.

MAKES BATS TOO BIG

Like most big leaguers, Nick took a whiff at the minors, before he was willing to admit that he was through.

Taking a berth with a club in the American association, he pitched with varying success. Some days he was very good and on others very bad. "Mostly bad," says Nick.

In a certain game in which the opposition made so many runs that the official scorer was forced to summon help to keep the figures straight, Nick decided he was through and made known his intention of quitting the game for all time.

The manager of the club, fond of Nick, tried his best to have him reconsider his decision to retire.

"If you can give me one good reason for quitting, I will accept your resignation," he told Altrock. "That's easy," replied Nick. "The bats are simply too big. I can't throw that little ball past them."

The resignation was accepted.

WOE FOR UMPIRES

Altrock, always a smart pitcher, made plenty of trouble for the umpires, despite the fact he seldom protested a ruling.

Like Walter Johnson, Nick was content to let the umpire do the umpiring while he took care of the pitching. It was Nick's near-balk movement that caused all the woe for the arbiters.

Altrock is generally given credit for originating a most deceptive move to first that has since been copied by smart southpaws.

Of the more modern pitchers, Sherry Smith of the Cleveland Indians has the nearest approach to Altrock's style. Smith has taken Altrock's stuff and added to it some variations of his own, making it in some ways even more deceptive.

Nick will tell you that it was a rarity for him to work a big league ball game without catching a runner off some base. Usually he caught the baserunners flatfooted, so deceptive was his movement, and immediately the umpire would be surrounded by the late opposition, claiming a balk.

DECEPTIVE MOVE

One of the pitching classes credited to Nick is the tossing of three batters in the ninth inning of a close game and the catching of each of them off first base. Well do I recall a certain game

SCORE OF 134

SUNNINGDALE, Eng., June 17. (AP)—Bobby Jones, American amateur golf champion, followed up his record breaking 68 of yesterday by shooting 68 in the second round of the qualification play for the British open golf championship tournament today giving him a low aggregate of 134.

Jones leads the field of 142 who are striving for the 48 places allotted to this, the southern section of the qualification play. Forty-two places are being decided among the 123 players in the central section of St. Anne's. No Americans were entered in the northern section at Western Gables, Scotland, where the ten best scores and ties for tenth qualified.

Others Qualify.

Other early qualifiers were three Brits, C. A. Whitcombe with an aggregate of 143, Cyril Tooley, former amateur champion, 148, and Harry Varlow, the old master.

Those qualifying will start in the championship proper, which begins at St. Anne's next Wednesday, and continues for three days. Watts Gunn, Atlanta amateur, and Walter Hagen, American free-lance professional led the field at St. Anne's at the end of yesterday's play with 72 each. The weather was threatening this morning.
