WIGHTMAN CUP COMES TO U. S.

WIMBLEDON, England, June 18. (AP)—The Wightman cup, emblem of team supremacy in women's tennis, comes back to the United States. The American players, after a hard battle took three of today's matches from the British making the final score of the two day tournament: U. S. 4; England 3.
In the final doubles match, Miss Mary Browne and Miss Elizabeth Ryan defeated Mrs. Kitty McKane Godfree and Miss Evelyn Collyer, 3-6, 6-2, 6-4, winning the cup for the U. S.
The cup thus comes back to U. S. for the first time since 1923, the year of its institution, when the Americans won it 7 to 0 at Forest Hills last year.

PSYCHOLOGY IN SPORT

There is no doubt as to the power of psychology in sport.
Recently the Philadelphia Athletics after toppling over Washington and New York in seven out of nine games, invaded Boston for a five-game series.
The moment Howard Ehmke, star pitcher of the Red Sox, began warming up, hopes of victory started to vanish on the part of the A's.
"There is one guy who is tough for us to beat," was the consensus of the Mackmen.
Ehmke, since his entry into the majors, has been a jinx for the Philadelphia club. No matter how poorly he may be going, he always rises to great heights against the Athletics.
This game was no exception. Piled against the great "Lerty" Groves, Ehmke hurled faultlessly, shutting out the Athletics, 2-0. He drove in the first run and scored the other one.

STRANGE COINCIDENCE

When the Athletics stopped New York after the Yankees had won 16 straight games, it was history repeating itself.
Earlier in the season New York had won nine straight games when it met Philadelphia in a three-game series. The Athletics won all three games.
Getting away from Philadelphia, New York started on another winning streak that reached 16 straight, when the Mackmen were again encountered.
This time in a four-game series. After breaking the streak, the Athletics won two more games, dropping the final contest.
And in each instance, it was Southpaw Bob Grove who put an end to the Yankees' winning ways.

Northwest Open Play Under Way in Spokane

SPOKANE, June 18. (AP)—With 52 golfers competing, play for the Pacific northwest open golf title started today at the Spokane country club. Seventy-two holes of medal play will decide the golf championship of the district.
Jack Houston, Seattle, will defend his title during the two days of play. Frank Dolp and Dr. O. F. Willing, Portland; Neil Christian, Yakima; Mortie Dutra, Aberdeen and Forest Watson, Spokane amateur, are other contenders for the title.

There will be no qualifying round, 36 holes of medal play being scheduled for each day of the tournament which is under the auspices of the Pacific Northwest professional golfers' association.
Many amateurs who intend to play next week are entered in the open event.

QUAKER CITY FIGHTER WINS

PHILADELPHIA, June 18 (AP)—With a smashing victory over Georges Carpentier, French title of the squared circles, Tommy Loughran, Philadelphia favorite today gazed with longing eyes toward the light heavyweight title held by Paul Berlenbach.
The champion has been invited by Philadelphia promoters to meet the winner of the Carpentier-Loughran bout in the municipal stadium here the scene of Loughran's victory over the Frenchman last night. The 175-pound title holder has offered \$50,000 to defend his title against the aggressive Philadelphia, Carpentier Gane.
Carpentier, orchid man of the French boulevards, fought a courageous fight against Loughran, but a sterling rally in the getaway frame brought the laurels to the Quaker City puncher.

The Frenchman gained a lead in the early rounds by an exhibition of boxing science and punching skill but a careless gesture in the seventh round gave Loughran an opening in which he inserted a potent right and Carpentier sank to the canvas for a count of nine.
Georges Weakens
He came up smiling but his actions were punctuated with a certain cautiousness thereafter which sapped his efficiency and gave Loughran the chance to come home victorious.
