In re proposed road petitioned for by J. P. T. Galloway, et al.: Continued for the term, and referred to Board of Road Viewers.

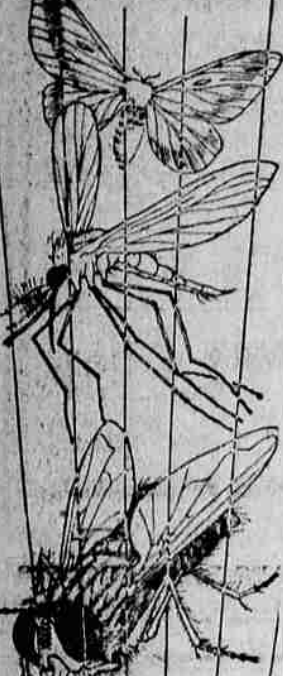
In re opening bids for surfacing portion of Mt. Glen Market road: Bids opened and that of C. R. Seitz being the lowest and best bid
