Wool Market Improved; Bids Indicate Trend
 PORTLAND, Ore., June 18 (AP)—A big improvement is seen in the wool market not only in the east but sealed bid sales held recently in the Condon and Shaniko districts. Clips were well taken at both sales and prices satisfactory to the growers were obtained. At the Condon sale 21 1/2 cents was paid for one clip, the highest price so far this season in Oregon. There were 15 separate lots, totalling approximately 144,300 pounds disposed of. Prices ranged from 29 1/2 cents to 31 1/2 cents. Buyers have picked up a number of clips in the Maupia section during the past few days and it is now believed that most of the good wools in the state have been sold. Alex. Livingston purchased the J. E. Abbott clip at Maupia, amounting to 50,000 pounds, for 28 cents. Other sales around Maupia brought the total up to 100,000 pounds. Little interest is shown in inferior grades of wool.

Wheat Values Average Higher as Rain Falls
 CHICAGO, June 18 (AP)—Wheat values on the board of trade today averaged higher because of heavy rain reported over sections of Oklahoma, Kansas and Texas, which it was understood would delay the movement of the new crop of wheat. Foreign news was also unfavorable, it being reported that wheat, aside from France, the condition in other parts of the continent was causing considerable uneasiness. The market here reacted somewhat shortly before the close when buying power gave out. Wheat closed 5/8c higher, not higher; corn 1/4c lower; oats steady 1/4c lower and provisions closed firm.

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CLIMB RESUMED BY STOCK PRICES IN WALL STREET

NEW YORK, June 18 (AP)—An avalanche of selling orders representing heavy profit taking by large traders, swept into the stock market just before the close today, carrying scores of issues 2 to nearly 9 points below yesterday's final quotations. Total sales again ran above 2,000,000 shares.

NEW YORK, June 18 (AP)—Stock prices resumed their movement to higher ground in the face of higher call money rates and an unusually large volume of week-end profit taking. Speculative interests switched from the steel, motors and oils to the rail, merchandising, rubber and equipment issues, early gains in these groups running from one to nearly ten points. Trading was maintained in relatively large volume, total sales averaging about 450,000 shares an hour.

There was little in the day's business news to influence the market movement but the sustained advance of the last week and the remarkable absorptive power of the market attracted outside buying and encouraged pool operation particularly in stocks known to harbor a large short interest or with promising dividend or merger possibilities.

Eggs Drop Two Cents After Recent Advance

PORTLAND, Ore., June 18 (AP)—Recent advances in the local egg market failed to hold and today fresh standard extras and current receipts are 3 cents lower at 30 cents and 27 cents respectively. Other grades remain steady and unchanged. Receipts are showing some improvement with the outside shipping demand still limited. The local butter market remains weak and well supplied. Prime first cubes are a fraction lower at 37 cents. Top grades of butter remain steady.

WOOL REPORT

BOSTON, June 18 (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say: "The past week has witnessed further distinct improvement in the wool market, sales to the domestic mills have increased, especially for domestic wool while prices are not notably dearer, as a general proposition it can be said that the decline in values has been halted and that the market is now against the buyer. The better feeling seems to be reflected in slightly increased activity in the west. The foreign markets are quiet with prices hardly changed. The coal strike continues in Britain and the business is therefore restricted in Yorkshire. Manufacturers state that the demand for goods is better and the outlook encouraging. Mohair, while not especially active, is firm. The rail and water shipments of wool from Boston from January 1, 1926 to June 17, inclusive, were 99,904,000 pounds against 75,450,000 pounds for the same period last year. The receipts from January 1, 1926 to June 17, 1926 inclusive, were 186,076,057 pounds against 142,641,600 pounds for the same period last year."
