Portland to Vote on School Tax Levy Today

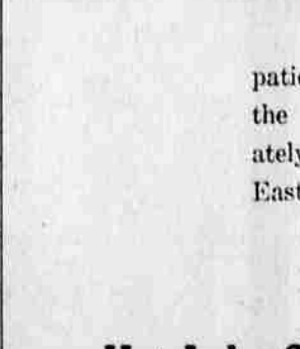
PORTLAND, Ore., June 19 (AP)—A special tax levy of \$1,200,000 for operating the city schools during 1927 and a proposal to authorize a bond issue of \$4,500,000 between now and 1932 to finance the school districts fifteen building program are the financial issues to be settled at the school election here today.

Two members of the school board will also be selected. The school board states that unless the tax levy passes the next school year will be cut to eight months and a curtailment of many schedules be made necessary.

Billy Evans Says:

HORNBY'S SLUMP
 It seems strange to look at the National League batting averages and not see the familiar name of Hornsby leading the list.

With the season about one-third over, Hornsby, one of the greatest hitters in the history of the game, is No. 25 in the ranking. However, Hornsby isn't so far away from the top as the difference between one and 25 would make it seem. Measured in percentage figures, just 29 points separate Hornsby from Cuyler, the league leader.

The only possible explanation that can be offered for Hornsby's slump is that the added responsibilities of managing the St. Louis Cardinals have affected his batting average. It is also possible that Hornsby has been hitting in hard luck. By that I mean he has been meeting the ball hard, but always straight at somebody.

The element of luck plays its part even with the greatest of batters.

TEAM DISAPPOINTED
 Hornsby's present batting average, which is at least 50 points below normal, is certain to be considerably bettered before the close of the season.

If he fails to lead the National League in batting this year, it will eliminate the only big league player with a chance to equal or better Cobb's remarkable feat of leading the ball club for nine consecutive years.

At the close of the 1925 campaign Hornsby had six consecutive batting championships of the National League to his credit. In the south, during spring training, he expressed to me the belief that he had an excellent chance to equal if not better Cobb's mark.

With the season one-third over his chances of capturing the 1926 crown are not so bright, but I am still of the opinion that at the close of the campaign he will be showing the way to the rest of the profession.

MANAGERIAL WOE
 I am positive Hornsby is deeply disappointed at the showing of his club to date.

Not inclined to boast and always reticent about offering predictions, Hornsby made this remark to me at San Antonio this spring: "There are only two ball clubs in the National League I fear, New York and Pittsburgh."

"You can take that as a prediction that I believe the Cardinals will finish third. And a team able to stick in the first division is always within striking distance of a pennant."
