NEW YORK, June 21. (AP)—Western clubs carried away top honors in the second clash of the season between the east and west in the major leagues which was concluded Sunday with the Cardinals establishing the best record for all teams in the inter-sectional strife with 11 victories and but one defeat.

On their invasion of the east, the Cardinals surpassed the showing of any outfit on the road during the year. Their only setback was by the Robins. The Pirates won seven of 12 contests while in the American circuit New York was the only club to draw better than an even break away from home, taking nine of 15 engagements.

The Braves held the distinction of being the only eastern team in the National league to profit by the tilt with the westerners. Bancroft's club won eight out of 14 games, while the Robins broke even in 12 tilts.

This Speaker's Indians led the American organization by winning 10 out of 14 contests. Collectively, western teams in the National league won 28 games and lost 27, while in the American they won 34 and lost 23.

The Senators' slump continued on their trek through the west, which ended in only four victories in 12 games for the American league champions.

DEPEND ON MARBERRY

Baseball records never do justice to a relief pitcher. The statistics show that Marberry won only eight games for Washington and lost six last season.

A pitcher with a sore arm invariably affects some mania; one that are not a part of his regular delivery.

The moment Marberry started to work in the exhibition games against the Braves his delivery lost its smoothness. He began favoring the arm and was batted hard. It wasn't a very auspicious debut; neither was it encouraging to Owen Griffith, who played so much dependence in him.

"The arm is O. K.," said Trainer Mike Martin. "Fred still lacks confidence in it, still believes it is sore." Notice how differently he pitched in practice and in the game."
