Sister Mary Says:

Breakfast—Orange juice with milk, cereal, thin cream, crisp waffles, sirup, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Baked timbale of carrots, whole wheat bread and butter sandwiches, rhubarb cobbler, milk, tea.

Dinner—Hot-pot of spring lamb, creamed swiss chard, boiled potatoes, pineapple cream puffs, graham bread, milk, coffee.

Hot-pot of spring lamb uses a cheap cut of meat to good advantage.

Hot-Pot of Spring Lamb One and one-half pounds shoulder of lamb, 1/2 cup pearl barley, 2 teaspoons salt, 3 large onions, 1 cup diced celery, 3 cups boiling water.

Remove skin from meat and cut in small pieces. Fry out fat from fat on the meat. Add onions peeled and cut in thin slices and cook over a low fire until golden brown.

Add barley and water and simmer for one and one-half hours. Add celery and salt and cook about 30 minutes longer or until celery is tender.

Carrots and potatoes can also be cooked with the meat but the barley thickens the stew very satisfactorily.

MISSING LINK REPORTED SEEN IN DARK AFRICA

LONDON, June 22, (AP)—A dispatch to the Daily Express from Johannesburg, South Africa, tells of an unnamed traveler who reports having encountered in the Northern Katanga district of the Belgian Congo a curious tribe of natives whose physical characteristics suggest "the missing link."

The traveler described one individual as half man and half ape. He was six feet tall and had an exceptionally long arm, a projecting jaw and a receding forehead. He had the normal negro nose, woolly hair, startling black eyes, a straggly beard and was of exceptionally powerful physique.

TO CHECK ON FAULTY RADIO

CHICAGO, June 22, (AP)—An \$18,000 radio receiver, designed to do things that few other sets can accomplish, soon will be in action in the Chicago area.

The receiver, most of which has been designed by E. A. Beane, supervisor of radio for the Ninth district, will be used as a "listening post" in checking the faults of transmitting stations. It will give the operator in ten seconds information that has required fifteen minutes of patient checking to accomplish heretofore.

Has Three Receivers The outfit contains three separate receivers for use in determining the correctness of the transmitter's emitted wave. The receivers consist of one set for use on the amateur bands with a wavelength of from 10 to 200 meters. The broadcast set will tune from 200 to 600 meters, while the third receiver has a range of 250 to 24,000 meters. All three sets are capable of spanning the country, and will even go beyond.

Four Steps of Frequency Mr. Beane's set consists of four steps of tuned radio frequency, with a detector, to which can be added three steps of audio frequency amplification, or eight tubes. An especially designed oscillation control system is used in the radio frequency end, in which the plate impedance of each step is made to balance with that of the grid. Each radio frequency stage is shielded and has an amplification factor of fifteen per tube as compared to six in the average tuned radio frequency set. Including only the detector, the panel length of the set is thirty inches.

Three Instruments to determine if the transmitter is straying off its wavelength, to measure the field strength or power of the broadcast and to check up on the modulation, have been included. In addition to numerous wavemeters and oscillators, and other apparatus used in a radio supervisor's "listening post."

"Measures" the Music Probably the most unusual of the trio is the "modulation checker." It not only measures and photographs the music sent out but gives the operator a vital clue to what is wrong with a station's modulation. It even determines if a singer or player is too close to the microphone.

The field strength measuring apparatus will show the field power sent out by the broadcast station. It is self-contained.

The frequency or wavelength of a station is measured by a set of piezo electric crystals which give an absolute check and quickly determine if a transmitter is tuned to the wavelength to which it is assigned.

It is planned to have the listening post ready by July 15. It will be placed as far as possible from the centers of intense power, probably near the lull line in northern Indiana.

Deschutes River Water Rights Decision Made

SALEM, Ore., June 22 (AP)—State Engineer Luther yesterday filed his order of determination adjudicating the water rights of Deschutes river and its tributaries, commencing a proceeding begun in 1922. The surveys and hydrographic investigations were completed in 1923. Testimony in the contests was completed on December 16, 1924, and the matter has been under consideration by the department since that time. One hundred and seventy-five claims were filed.
