

PLAN AIRMAIL FOR ALASKA

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 22. (AP)—E. H. Merrill and Roy Davis, aviators of Portland, Ore., leave here tomorrow on a 1000-mile flight to Seward, Alaska, to engage in an airmail service between Seward and points within 200 miles.

Their machine, an aeromarine flying boat, has a 180-horsepower eight cylinder motor and carries three persons besides the pilot. The flight to Seward is in five jumps. Albert Hay and Prince Rupert, both in British Columbia, are first and second stops, and Ketchikan, Wrangell, third and fourth.

Merrill wrecked a seaplane in a storm last year on Chugach island, 50 miles southwest of Seward.

WASHINGTON, June 22 (AP)—Speeding up of the trans-continental airmail service through the addition of 50 new Douglas airplanes, was announced today. Rearrangement of schedules will permit transmission of mail between middle west points and San Francisco in slightly more than 24 hours.

Funeral Is Held for Dowager Queen Olga

ROME, June 22 (AP)—Public funeral services for Dowager Queen Olga, of Greece, were held today in the Russian church, the Archimandrite Simeon, officiating. Private services were held last night at the villa, near here, where she died Saturday. King Victor Emmanuel, of Italy, was represented at today's services and wreaths were sent by Premier Mussolini and the king of Denmark.

The body will be taken tomorrow to Florence, where it will be buried in the Russian church near that of Olga's son, King Constantine.

DEVELOPMENT OF HORSEPOWER NEAR COQUILLE LIKELY

WASHINGTON, June 22 (AP)—Interior department engineers have found that development of 25,000 continuous horsepower at natural storage reservoir sites on Coquille river in Oregon is possible.

With six billion board feet of timber within seven miles of the larger reservoir sites, the department stated, eventually the sites may be developed for power in the timber industry.

The entire Coquille river basin was studied. The engineers reported that the power resources of the basin probably will not be utilized until hydro-electric energy can compete with electric energy generated by steam produced from mill refuse, or until the demand exceeds the supply of energy so produced.

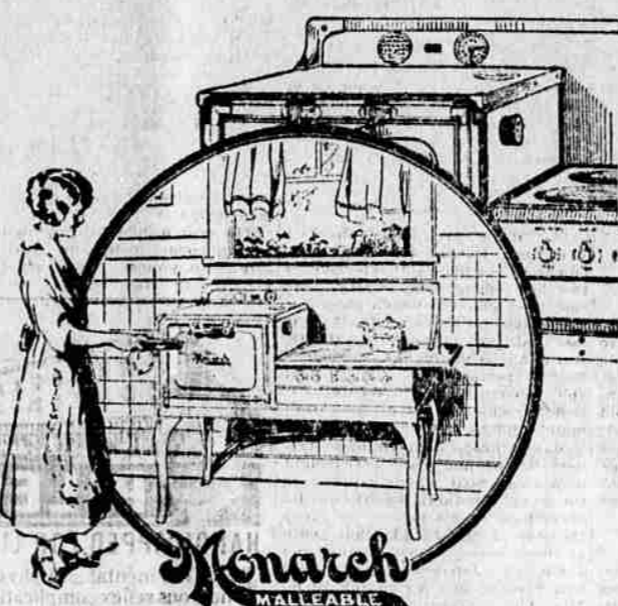
