**CONVINCING PROOF**

Hagen's play in the various British open tournaments in which he has contested, could also be offered as convincing proof of his fighting spirit.

In his first attempt to win the British title Hagen was off his game and finished nowhere in particular, about 57th, I believe. Touted as a possible winner, his showing was a distinct disappointment.

Did Hagen, after it was apparent that he was out of the running, pick up and quit? No, sir! He continued courageously on to the finish, playing each shot as carefully as if he had a chance.

Such conditions called for competitive spirit far more than if riding along on the crest of success. Any one can be a good winner, the test is to be a game loser.

**TWICE WINNER**

In 1922 Hagen was rewarded for his efforts and persistency by winning the British open. The following year he lost by a single stroke to Arthur Havers. He came back to win again in 1924.

Two victories out of three consecutive attempts in the British open and a one-stroke defeat, tells the story of Hagen's consistent golf plus the will to win.

WIMBLEDON, June 24. (AP) — Elizabeth Ryan and Mary K. Browne, of California, today defeated Suzanne Lenglen and Didi Vlasto, of France, in a thrilling three-set doubles struggle before 17,000 spectators by 3-6, 9-7, 6-2. Defeat which eliminated the French team in the first round of the tournament was a bitter pill for Mlle. Lenglen, but she took it without any particular show of emotion.

The result was evidently popular with the large gallery, which had evidenced keen disappointment and disapproval over Mlle. Lenglen's failure to appear for the match yesterday. Although the spectators were impartial in applauding both sides during the play, their cheers for the American victors echoed from the big stadium for fully five minutes.

### DERN DEFEATS CHAMPION THYE

PORTLAND, Ore., June 24 (AP) — Ira Dorn, Salt Lake grappler, took two falls from Ted Thye, of Portland, in one of the most spectacular bouts of the season last night. Thye was a victim of Dorn's headlocks in the first fall which Dorn took in 21 minutes 50 seconds.

Thye succeeded in gaining the second fall with a crotch hold in 18 minutes 50 seconds. It was another crotch hold in the third session that gave Dorn his chance to pin Thye.

For the first time, ringside weighting in was witnessed by the fans. Thye weighed 174½ and Dorn 182. Being over the light heavyweight limit, Dorn could not claim the championship through his victory.

In the preliminary, Jimmie Anderson and Bob Myers wrestled 20 minutes to a draw.

#### COMPETITIVE SPIRIT

In perhaps no sport is a competitive spirit more essential to success than in golf.

There are so many things to upset the temperament in golf that unless the player possesses the instinct to fight back, it is an easy matter to find an excuse to curl up and quit cold.

It is doubtful if there is a golfer in all the world who has more of the competitive spirit in his make-up than Walter Hagen.

There you have the real reason for Hagen's greatness, although it must be admitted that his game is all it should be and then some.

Golf rivals will frankly admit that no matter how far Hagen is trailing the field there is always the fear that he will get going.

The Hagen menace that always exists in golf is based on fact.

#### ANENT HAGEN

Recently, in glancing over the various achievements of Hagen in tournament play, I unearthed some very interesting dope.

Hagen has to his credit the winning of every major championship to which he has been eligible. No other player can boast such a remarkable record.

However, no better proof could be offered of the competitive spirit possessed by Hagen than his uncanny success in winning the play-

off in tournament matches in which he has finished in a tie with one or more players.

In such matches there is a terrific strain back of every shot that is played. But it seems that at such times Hagen is always at his best.

#### IN TRIPLE TIE

In 1916 Hagen finished in a triple tie in the Metropolitan open championship. He beat J. M. Barnes and Charles Hoffman in the play-off.

Three years later I followed him around the Brae Burn course, just outside of Boston, to see him come

from behind and tie Mike Brady in the National open. The following day, I watched him triumph over Mike in a nerve-racking match.

The next season he tied in the French open for first place and again won the play-off. In 1923 he trimmed Bill Mehlhorn in the Texas open, after he had finished all-even at the 36th hole. He went 39 holes to trim Al Watrous and 46 to conquer Leo Diegel.
