'The Auction Block' At Sherrys Is Good Entertainment

There are pictures that leave a bad taste in one's mouth, and there are pictures that send their audiences home with a warm feeling under the cheek, feeling enthusiastically satisfied with themselves as well as with their choice of an evening's entertainment.

"The Auction Block," the Herbert Henry production which opened a two days' run last night at the Sherry theater, belongs in the latter class. The principal reason for this is that it brings Charles Ray back to his vast army of fans in a part that cannot help but please them, and gives Eleanor Boardman not only an opportunity to display her ever increasing talent, but shows her at her love-liest.

The modern version of "The Auction Block" bears but slight resemblance to the one made seven years ago. The former was an out-and-out melodrama, while the latter is a delightfully human comedy. It is a shade more serious than the fare which Director Henry has been dealing out to the public recently, but even so, is essentially comedy.

Harry Langdon exceeds expectations. We thought he would be good. Now we know that he is great. He is as great a comedian as Charlie Chaplin and Harold Lloyd.

"Tramp, Tramp, Tramp," which has a premiere showing at the Arcade theater last night, definitely establishes Langdon as a top-notch among film comedians. He is beyond the shadow of a doubt as funny an actor as has ever been seen in the films.

Langdon's humor is enigmatical. He is the picture of innocence involved in all sorts of complications. Very, very funny indeed.

"Tramp, Tramp, Tramp," is an appropriate title for the story of a transcontinental hike. Harry's peregrinations take him all over the country and into all manner of difficulties. He is launched over a precipice, he is set to work on a rock pile and he is caught in a cyclone.

The cyclone episode is particularly stirring. It is said that the wind blew with such terrific velocity that the cameramen who photographed the scene were lashed to trees and posts to prevent being blown away.

Beautiful Joan Crawford plays opposite the comedian. The rest of the highly able cast includes Tom Murray, Edward Davis, Alec Francis and Brooks Benedict.

Harry Edwards, who has been associated with Langdon for some time, directed "Tramp, Tramp, Tramp," which will be shown at the Arcade theater again today and Saturday.

"Born To The West" Sets New High Film Standard

In "Born To The West," Paramount's picture of Zane Grey's story, which came to the Star theater yesterday for its premiere showing, admirers of Jack Holt declare that the role of "Colorado Ruff" is one of the finest he has ever given to the screen.
