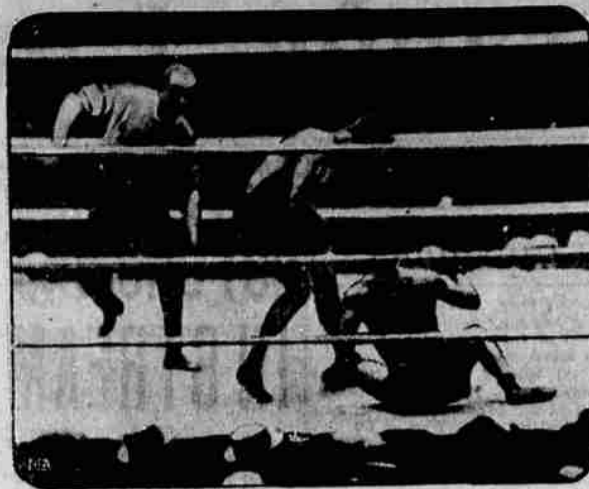

## BOBBY JONES AGAIN VICTOR

ST. ANNES, England, June 25. (AP)—Bobby Jones, American golfing marvel, today added the British open crown to his long list of trophies.

He completed the 72 hole final with an aggregate of 291 strokes. At Watrous, Grand Rapids professional, was second with 292. Walter Hagen tied with George von Elm, for third with 295, in an all-American finish.

The trophy goes to the United States for the fifth time. It was first captured by a golfer from America in 1921 when Jock Hutchison won. Walter Hagen was victorious in 1922 and again in 1924 while Long Jim Barnes won last year.

**RELENTLESS JINX**  
A relentless jinx has camped on the trail of Southpaw "Lefty" Grove for several weeks. The jinx is utter inability on the part of his teammates to make any runs for him. One can't win ball games when opposing pitchers keep the Athletics from scoring.

Recently Grove suffered defeat in three successive starts, despite superb pitching, because in each game the Mackmen failed to put over a single run. Against Boston, he drew Howard Ehmke, ace of the Red Sox staff, and lost 2-0. For seven innings the two teams went runless, Ehmke, by the way, drove in the first and deciding run of the game in the eighth session.

Pitted against Chicago, Grove turned in another great game, but "Red" Faber held the Mackmen runless and another fine pitching performance was wasted. Cleveland was faced next. The veteran Sherry Smith opposed Grove; a battle of southpaws. Defeat in 11 innings by the score of 1-0 was again the portion of Mack's sensational southpaw.

Certainly a series of tough breaks but things can't always go that way and the superlative pitching that Grove has been doing will be rewarded by far more victories than defeats.

**CHOICE REPARTEE**  
Says a utility outfielder, who has broken into only a few games this year, to a veteran umpire, who has just chased him for making too strenuous a protest: "If you are a good umpire, then I am ready to quit playing and start arbitrating."

He's a real champion, always willing to defend his title."

**PITCHING BIG ITEM**  
Pitching is still the most important feature of a pennant-winning ball club. No better example of that truth could be offered than the Washington club of the American league. Stanley Harris won pennants in 1924-25 because a veteran pitching staff, aided and abetted by one

of the best relief pitchers in the history of the game, Fred Marberry, delivered for him. This year the Washington club has failed to live up to expert opinion, because the pitching of the veteran stars has temporarily faltered.

Over a stretch of a dozen games recently not a starting pitcher was able to finish his ball game. It is worry of that sort that makes gray hairs for a manager and destroys the morale of the club.

Washington still has a mighty left hand club and when it gets good pitching is hard to beat. If warm weather ever arrives it is just possible that the veteran pitching staff will show a reversal of form. If so Washington will make plenty of trouble in the late stages of the race.
