RUM-FILLED TORPEDOES

NEW YORK—Foreign craft have been bombarding these shores with rum-filled torpedoes, or at least contemplating doing so. Twenty steel fifty gallon cylinders with an air tank on each were found on the British schooner *Roose M. H.* captured off Montuk Point with \$200,000 worth of Scotch malt. Four cylinders contained hooch. Each cylinder had a hook so a boat from shore could take it in tow.

Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)

Breakfast—Halves of cantaloupe, cereal, thin cream, crisp toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Bouillon, croquets, radishes, open tomato salad sandwich, milk, tea.

Dinner—Breaded veal cutlets, baked potato balls, creamed spinach, stuffed beef salad, junket cream pudding, graham bread, milk, coffee.

While children under school age may not have the sandwich suggested in the luncheon menu as it's prepared for adults, they may have the tomato and lettuce on buttered bread with some of the celery sprinkled over the tomato. No special dishes need be prepared for small persons in addition to the day's menu.

Open Tomato Sandwich

Three medium-sized tomatoes, 4 tablespoons chopped nut meats, 4 tablespoons minced celery, 2 tablespoons chopped stuffed olives, 4 tablespoons mayonnaise, lettuce, 4 thin slices bread, butter.

Peel tomatoes and cut each into four slices. Combine nuts, celery, olives and mayonnaise. Cream butter and spread bread evenly. Cover each slice of bread with crisp lettuce and put 2 slices of tomato on each. Cover each slice of tomato with a layer of the mayonnaise mixture and serve.

If head lettuce is not at hand cut leaf lettuce in ribbons and cover bread with these arranging the ribbons in two little nest-effects to hold the tomato slices.

Olives stuffed with pimentoes are used.

Willows Lake Level Low; Annual Run Falls

ENTREPRISE, Ore., June 25.—Willows lake is now down to its natural level and contains no stored water whatever. The ordinary June run-off of water from the mountains which comes with the melting of the last of the 1926 snow, did not happen this year and at the highest the lake was not more than seven feet above low mark, whereas the dam is built to hold about 25 feet additional water.

This means that irrigation ditches coming from the main river will receive only the volume of water coming down from the mountains day by day, and have no reserve to draw on. The water is already used sparingly.

Damage to Menefee Mill About \$250,000

PORTLAND, Ore., June 25 (AP)—Damage of from \$225,000 to \$250,000 has been placed on the loss by fire of the L. B. Menefee Lumber company mill at Rainier, Ore., which burned yesterday. The mill which cut about 100,000 feet daily, was operating only one shift.

SALEM, Ore., June 25 (AP) For "conduct unbecoming an officer and a gentleman" A. H. Shortes, a state traffic officer assigned to the Astoria district has been discharged from the service, according to T. A. Rafferty state traffic office inspector. Shortes had been a member of the state force for about a year working the Medford and Eugene districts before being assigned to Astoria. His dismissal followed the receipt of numerous complaints.
