BREAKFAST — Chilled cantaloupe, cereal, thin cream, codfish puffs, crisp rye toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON — Jellied salmon, cucumber sauce, whole wheat bread, rice soufflé, milk, tea.

DINNER — Broiled mutton cutlets, creamed potatoes, kale in lemon butter, stuffed celery salad, snow pudding, oatmeal bread, milk, coffee.

A vegetable soup should be provided for children under six years of age to take the place of the fish in the luncheon menu. The jellied salmon is well worth keeping in mind as it makes a good picnic or "company" dish during the hot months. It looks expensive but does not make too big a hole in one's pocketbook.

Jellied Salmon.
One and one-half cups flaked salmon, 1 tablespoon granulated gelatin, 2 tablespoons cold water, 1 egg, 1 1/4 tablespoons flour, 1 tablespoon sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon mustard, 1/4 teaspoon paprika, 2 tablespoons melted butter, 1/4 tablespoons lemon juice, 1/2 cup milk.

If canned salmon is used remove fish from can and pour boiling water through fish. Remove any skin and bones and separate into flakes. Mix and sift flour, mustard, sugar, salt and paprika and add to melted butter. Add egg slightly beaten with milk. Cook over hot water, stirring constantly until mixture is perfectly smooth and thickened. In the meantime soften gelatin in cold water for five minutes. Remove sauce from heat and stir in gelatin. Stir until gelatin is dissolved and fold in fish flakes. Pour into individual molds and let stand several hours to chill and become firm. Serve on lettuce.

To make the cucumber sauce pare and mince 1 cucumber. Drain through cheesecloth. Beat 1/2 cup sour cream until stiff with 1/4 teaspoon salt and a few grains of pepper. Slowly beat in 1 tablespoon vinegar. Chill about three-quarters of an hour. When ready to serve fold in drained cucumber. — (Copyright, 1926, NEA Service, Inc.)

Grand Jury to Probe Charges of Protection

PORTLAND, Ore., June 26. (AP) — The county grand jury has been ordered to start an investigation next week of charges made by the Rev. Clement G. Clarke, pastor of the first Congregational church, that gambling has been protected in Portland, and that higher up officials were "participating in corruption."

Mayor George L. Baker called upon District Attorney Stanley Meyers to make the inquiry after Clarke published a letter to the ministerial association in which he made the charges. Elsie A. Baker, president and attorney of the Anti-Saloon League, has been designated as a special deputy district attorney to assist in the investigation.

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MORE CLOTHES, STYLE DICTUM

NEW YORK, June 26. (AP) — More clothes are decreed for girls, society and sportswomen in France, whence come the styles, and the New York stage, are involved in fashion's latest decree. Florence Ziegfeld, who admits he imported the vogue of stage nudity, now says he is so disgusted with its development in the hands of "less artistic producers" that he is going to lead a campaign for more clothes in glorification of the American girl of the stage.

In a statement deploring the "daring and coarseness" of present exploiters on Broadway, the theatrical producer says the stage must be cleaned up and asks the theater-going public to cooperate by supporting only those shows that are free from displays of naked women.

Although he says he was the first producer to stage nudity in New York City, he did it artistically, he avows, with no immorality intended, whereas imitators lacking artistic guidance, have done otherwise. Broadway producers, he added, "are pandering to the vilest tastes of playgoers to force a box office stampede."

"I am leading the movement back to artistry and normalcy in the theater," the statement continues. "There is but one thing

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
