Comes Now Recess Time For Pastors

Congregations Planning to Unite So Teachers Can Have Their Month of Play.

Holy communion will be celebrated at the First Baptist church Sunday morning, the sacrament having been advanced a week from the regular place on the July Fourth calendar in order that the Rev. George Albert Pollard and his congregation may observe the rite together before he and his family leave on their annual vacation. The communion sermon theme will be "The Fair God." Mr. Pollard will preface the message with a talk to the little folk on "The Man Who Had the Pass-Key to Heaven." Sunday school will be at 9:45 a. m., and the men's class, under the pastor's leadership, at 7 p. m.

While the Pollards are absent, the congregation will be joined for morning worship by the members of the Presbyterian church. Their pastor, the Rev. William Crosby Ross, will address the joint audience from the Baptist pulpit. Next month, while Mr. Ross is away, the two parishes will meet under Mr. Pollard at the Presbyterian church.

After tomorrow evening, when Mr. Pollard announces he will speak on "The Christ in Action," the Baptist folk will unite with the Methodist and Presbyterian

congregations for 4 p. m. services to be circulated among the three churches. The first will be July 4, with Dr. Henry W. Parker, of the M. E. pulpit, discarding before an assembly in the Baptist auditorium.

Mr. and Mrs. Pollard, with their three children, plan to leave Monday for Nyasa, Ore., where they will pass most of their vacation at the ranch homes of her two sisters in the Snake river valley. Her parents also will be there for the summer. The pastor and his wife may attend the summer assembly of the Southern Idaho convention in the Sawtooth mountains about the middle of July. They expect to be back in La Grande in time for the monthly business meeting July 29.

First Presbyterian
The sacrament of the Lord's Supper is to be solemnized also at the First Presbyterian altar at 11 o'clock Sunday morning. All members of the church are privileged to participate. The Rev. William Crosby Ross announces that he will deliver the concluding sermon on the lives of the disciples. Special music will be a part of the worship.

Summer attendance at the Sunday school sessions each Sabbath at 9:45 shows a real interest in the study of God's truth, the pastor observes.

Christian Endeavor society at 7 p. m. is for all young people who care to attend.

Central Church of Christ.

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Anniversary, Patron Saint Share Honors

St. Peter's Episcopal Church to Keep Sixty-Second Birthday at Patronal Festival.

A peculiar significance attaches to the services with which the Episcopalians of this city plan to keep St. Peter's day tomorrow. For the holy day not only commemorates the martyrdom of their patron saint, but it also marks the sixty-second anniversary of the founding of the church in La Grande. Another touch of interest is added by the fact that the birthday of their rector, the Rev. Oliver Riley, also is honored by the observance.

The anniversary service will be combined with the patronal festival at 11 o'clock in the morning. Mrs. Harriett McDonald and Judge J. D. Slater, whose membership dates back to the early history of the church, will be called upon for reminiscences. The musical program, under the direction of Mrs. H. N. Ashby, will include two anthems by the choir, "My Faith in Thee" (Dudley) and "Heaven Is Not Far Away" (Williams). Mr. and Mrs. George Birnie will be heard in a duet.

The day will begin with holy eucharist at 8 a. m., followed at 9:45 by church school meeting. Mr. Riley will speak on "The Glory to Be Revealed" at the mission service at 8 o'clock in the evening.

St. Peter's church stands out in the city's history as the first religious group to erect a home of its own.

Organized in 1873 by the Rt. Rev. B. Wister Morris, missionary to the states of the Northwest, the Episcopalians here were known at first as Trinity parish. They later adopted the name of the martyred saint in accordance with the desires of an eastern woman who donated \$500 toward a church home in La Grande.

The contract for the original building was let in January, 1874, according to records kept by Judge Slater. The cost, exclusive of doors and windows, which were memorials, was \$1800. Thirteen years later it was moved to the new town nearer the railroad. The little building served the parish until about two years ago, when the present structure was erected.

LATTER DAY SAINTS OF UNION STAKE TO ASSEMBLE AT BAKER

U. of O. Girl Speaks.
What was acclaimed as anything but the smaller part of the program was an enthusiastically received address by a Wallowa girl who is home on vacation from the University of Oregon at Eugene, in the person of Miss Frances Cherry, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George W. Cherry.

Miss Cherry, who spoke of the plans of the university to celebrate October 12 to 23 on the campus, the "fifty years of loyal service to the state of Oregon," held her audience raptly the few minutes of her talk—and it was agreed that she said much.

Expressing what he was told was an unwarranted over-sensitiveness about a good thing, State Senator Albert R. Hunter, of Island City, was prevailed upon by Dr. Phyl to repeat his interest in an Eastern Oregon normal school for teachers. "I suppose the members of our caravan are sick and tired of hearing about this," was Mr. Hunter's apology.

Stewart Tulley, a former Wallowa boy who also is home for the summer, and who is director of music at Junior college, Sacramento, Cal., and formerly assistant director of music at Oregon Agricultural college, was another speaker.

Boy Scout Officers Talk.
William D. Janin, boy scout executive from the Everett, Wash., council, made a brief address on his labors in this field in the way of attempting to create additional interest in the scout movement.

He has been working to direct financial aid to proposed scout troops in Wallowa. Dr. Phyl, who recently returned from the International Rotary convention at Denver, Colo., appended to Mr. Janin's remarks a description of the part the boy scouts played at the Rotary meet. He said the little fellows directed pedestrians traffic and that their conduct was not only courteous but helpful to the stranger and a delight to observe.

A Wallowa orchestra known as Reed Cox troubadours filled in with jassy numbers during the meal, sending desires of tripping the light fantastic through the minds of the eaters.

Friendly Spirit Predominant.
When the toastmaster called on Bruce Cox, chairman of the entertainment committee of the Wallowa Commercial association to receive the Union county delegates, the latter said he had heard that Union folk liked Wallowa county. "It seems from the representation here," he declared, "that La Grande wants to locate at Wallowa, and we welcome them. We know we have a great many undeveloped resources in our country, and we are glad La Grande and Union county are with us in wanting to bring in the work of the world."

The toastmaster called on C. M. O'Day, of The Observer, who spoke on the apparent effect of the relationship between the two counties from the standpoint of a newspaper man, as did Harold Hamstreet, publisher of the Wallowa Sun and secretary of the Wallowa commercial association. "I have met quite a number of you in a business way," said Mr. O'Day, "but at such times the pressure of engagements and duties made it impossible for you to express your real feelings. In such a meeting as this, however, where jollity and good will prevail, it is possible for us to feel the pulse of relationship and good fellowship as it really exists, when all of us are fully relaxed and feel like talking and listening because we came here to do that." The speaker added that he had noted just such a condition in each of the Wallowa towns visited by the caravan.

Mr. Hamstreet said he could appreciate this viewpoint also, declaring that "the people of Wallowa in particular appreciate the coming of the caravan to speak good will under such favorable conditions." That the Evening Observer passed to everyone present just as the meal began were thoroughly appreciated was mentioned by a number present. Dr. Phyl noted audibly that some were reading as well as eating.

Wallowan Sees New Era.
Attorney George W. Cherry, of Wallowa, said that he foresaw a new era in the close workings of these two counties, that with the adoption of booster tactics jointly and cooperatively, would bring about a considerable change in this section of Eastern Oregon. He groined himself illustrative as well as illustrious by quoting from classics such facts as tended to prove that whenever the individual or a community spent a fair portion of its time in commending the work of others, those assisted would automatically help him who had assisted them. By the same token, he pointed out the standing of their neighbors were themselves elevated.

Mr. Cherry injected a bit of political localism into his talk which was, with the timely assistance of the toastmaster, repeated to his usual jovial vein by Jack Peare, La Grande jeweler. This repartee had to do mostly with the necessity of democrats going after republicans with clubs and guns, with Mr. Peare citing the vice versa.

May Make Up Caravan.
James Clifford, superintendent of the Reardan-Hicks Lumber company operations in Wallowa county, described this gathering as a friendly meeting as I have ever seen," assuring the visitors that their presence was bound to help cement the relations of each county with the other.

W. H. Guild Speaks.
W. H. Guild, the new division superintendent of the O.-W. R. & N., stated he had lived most of his life in Portland—all but nine months spent in Pendleton, but that he preferred Eastern Oregon, and especially like them, two counties. He was glad, he said, the company had sent him to La Grande.

The mention was made of the possibility and advisability of Wallowa county making up a caravan to visit Union county some time in the future, and while nothing definite was stated, nor were there plans made, from Mr. Clifford's remarks it was gleaned that Wallowans have such a move in mind. Dr. Phyl immediately invited them to consider this seriously. Mr. Clifford also brought up the point that the splendid rector of the church was worthy of especial mention, whereupon "the cooks and servers" were thanked profusely and appreciation voiced.

The concert by the La Grande musical band preceding the banquet drew much attention. O. G. Crawford, of Jowett, selected the ranks of the band boys to 13 during the day, he playing partitone, substituting for trombone.

Marble Deposits Seen.

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with caravanners at Wallowa lake resort, many of them remaining for the midday meal, which, owing to the number who visited the black marble and time project on the Alder slope between Joseph and Enterprise, was somewhat delayed. The black marble and lime enterprise came in for much boosting on the part of both visitors and residents during the meetings at the various towns. The development of this resource was held to be of paramount importance to that county.

Colon R. Eberhard served as toastmaster at the Wonderland hotel, held there instead of at Joseph, with the latter town out in a body.

Good Meet With Joseph.
On this occasion E. M. Calvert, president of the Joseph commercial club, not only welcomed the visitors but emphasized the importance of such a get-together program. Mr. Calvert, who also is station agent for the Union Pacific at Joseph, said when Mr. C. J. Collins, the new general passenger agent of the road, had recently visited there he had asked him the possibility of running excursion trains into Wallowa country. The suggestion was made that certain activities be started to further attract visitors, and the matter is being considered seriously.

O. G. Crawford, publisher of the Joseph Herald and secretary of the commercial organization in his town, corroborated Mr. Calvert's opinion of the good being accomplished by the caravan.

H. B. Davidhizar, Joseph rancher, discussed the necessity of the farmer in civic and community affairs. Indicating the almost unparallel part which the tiller of the soil must play in feeding the world, he rounded off his talk by saying that the exodus of young folk from the farm to the city was compensated for to some extent by the improved machinery now at the farmer's disposal, with which 10 men's work now is done by one man.

G. L. Larson, of La Grande, urged a greater pulling together, a closer cooperation, a more complete pooling of development thoughts, by people of both counties. Earl C. Reynolds, secretary of the Union county chamber, was similarly heard, explaining the work attendant on getting the business men of all communities together to make such a far-reaching gathering possible. W. H. Guild was another speaker.

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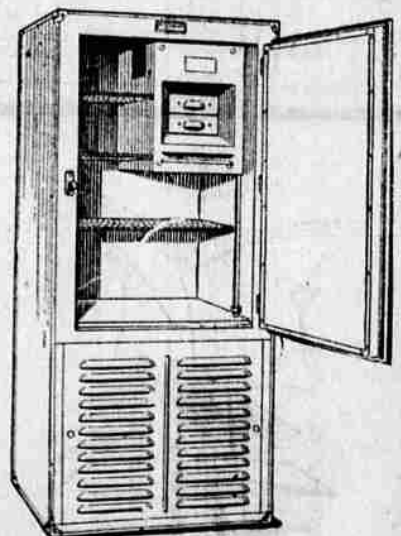
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
