The time to go to the movies is when you are assured of seeing a perfectly entertaining film. This sort of assurance the management feels secure in giving as far as regards "The Girl From Montmartre," which is being shown at the Arcade theater today and Tuesday.
Based on Anthony Pryde's best seller, "Spanish Sunlight," the picture is animated with more of the precious breath of life than even the book. It is a vibrant, fragrant, and tender recital of love in the Balearic Isles of old Spain. Charming Barbara La Marr, cast as a dancing girl who has tasted life's bitterest dross in the wild shadows of Montmartre, brings to her personation the intensity and ardor of age-old love. Canine Player Has Heroic War Record

"Lightning," the wonder dog, now being directed in his thrilling, almost human stunts under the Columbia banner, has an enviable record with the American Expeditionary Forces. Not so much in the matter of accomplishment, because he was just a pup when he touched French soil, but in what he has seen and heard.
"Lightning's" owner is a prominent doctor of Los Angeles. When the United States entered the Great War in 1917, "Lightning" was eight months old. His master was assigned to one of the first regiments to go over. There he was to join his hospital unit.
"Lightning" was such an appealing little fellow that the doctor took him along. Otherwise he would have had to give him away and he hated to do that as the pup was very valuable, being that wonderful combination of half police dog and half wolf and retaining the best features and characteristics of both.
So on the crowded transport bearing him to a foreign land from which so many were never to return, "Lightning" called. He wailed with puffed puppy eyes the strange people. He heard with ever pricking ears the startling sounds of a ship at sea, which he gazed upon for the first time in his life.
It might be thought that all the excitement and lack of care a pup would have to undergo in the responsibility of his master for care for his human life, would harm the carefully nurtured dog. But untold generations of indomitable canines lay behind him. And countless centuries of wild ancestors whose habitual lot was cold and hungry made him look with unconscious fortitude on his different surroundings.
"Lightning" was with the Americans every foot of the murderous path to victory. Then he came home. His fine bearing and intelligence led him to a contract with Columbia for whom he has made "Lure of the Wild," which is due at the Sherry theater today. "Comedy showin' 'Toa For Pore."
