### HUSKIES BEAT EASTERN CREW

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., June 29. (AP)—The University of Washington's eight mighty huskies once again rule the intercollegiate seas. Through four miles of a tranquil Hudson with the shadows of twilight deepening, the Pacific coast stalwarts, pupils of the famous Gustav Calkins, pulled their way to victory by a dozen feet over the Naval Academy eight in yesterday's classic climax to the annual regatta of the intercollegiate rowing association.

Washington won by the margin of a second, barely a full stroke, in one of the fastest four mile races, as well as one of the most boult stirring.

A Calicut-coached eight also romped off with the junior varsity race in decisive fashion, leaving Columbia's smashing victory in the freshman race as the only consolation for the east.

West Triumphant.

No such overthrow of eastern talent has occurred before in the 25 years of the regatta's history.

In five straight years of varsity competition, Washington has finished 2-1-2-1, while her junior varsity has captured junior varsity honors for two years in a row.

Only the naval academy's crew can rival the record of Washington in this period and yesterday's victory evens the score between the

rivals of east and west. They have met four times in the last five years and each has registered two triumphs with the other as the runner up each time.

Washington Man Coach.

A Washington man, Bob Butler, out of college only three years coached the navy eight that pushed the Huskies to the limit before yielding the championship. This was Butler's first year at the academy of navy rowing team.

Few among the 30,000 spectators who saw their battle from shores, ships and the observation train failed to feel the thrill of a struggle in which Washington setting the pace from a start of its own and, in a nip and tuck closing drive, held off the most determined efforts of the sailors.

The other race among the six crews that followed the leaders became a march for Syracuse which lacked third place by two lengths. Then came Pennsylvania, Columbia, California, Wisconsin and Cornell.

Washington's victory in the junior varsity at three miles left Pennsylvania a length and a half behind. California was third, Syracuse fourth, Cornell fifth and Columbia last.

Mrs. Molla Mallory, former American champion won her way into the semi-finals by defeating Miss K. Bouman of Holland, 3-6, 7-5, 6-2. Her next opponent will be Senorita De Alvarez, the Spanish champion.

REPEATS VICTORY

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 29. (AP)—The Seventy-Sixth Artillery polo team of Monterey, Cal., won its second game in the northwest championship tournament yesterday by trouncing the Finley All-Stars of Portland on the Vancouver Barracks oval. ## Billy Evans Says:

### WELLS' GREAT WORK

Ed. Wells, the husky southpaw of the Detroit Tigers, recently pitched 32 consecutive innings without being scored on. While that stands out as the best pitching performance of the year, it is quite far removed from the record.

The Philadelphia Athletics, who have a penchant for breaking record feuds, turned Wells back by scoring four runs in the second inning of a recent clash between the two clubs.

It was the Athletics, by the way, who stopped New York after the Yankees had won 16 straight ball games. "Lefty" Grove did the pitching, striking out 10 of the opposition.

Walter Johnson, who, like Ty Cobb, owns most of the records in his particular line, pitched 56 consecutive innings in 1913 without being scored on. That's the record. The best National league performance along those lines is credited to Ed Ruelbach, who went 44 innings before an opponent was able to tally against his pitching.

### WILL TO WIN

Ed Wells is one of those pitchers who has been successful because he has the will to win in his makeup.

The Detroit players have a lot of fun kidding Wells by referring to him as the "psychology pitcher." They insist Ed looks and talks the opposition out of making base hits.

Aside from the feat of working 32 scoreless innings, Wells also has the distinction of being the stowest pitcher in captivity.

Before pitching the ball, Wells carefully gives the batter a once-over. While doing so, he may make some remark about what a tough time the batter is going to have making any hits off his delivery.

After going through a lot of preliminary motions, Wells uses a very jerky delivery, in which he all but comes to a stop several times. Such an unorthodox style makes it difficult for the batters to rate his speed and time the ball.

### PLEASES HIS BOSS

The success that Wells has met so far this year has been more than pleasing to Manager Cobb. If there is one thing the Tiger leader admires in a player, the pitcher in particular, it is a competitive spirit. Wells has that.

Players who joined the big show at the same time Wells did and apparently had more stuff are back in the bushes while Wells is still

traveling around the American league circuit, doing very well, thank you.

Cobb liked the spirit that Wells displayed. He never lost confidence in him, despite some early shaky performances. Now that he appears to have delivered with a vengeance, Cobb feels that he has been amply repaid for nursing Wells along.

### AN ODD NICKNAME

There is much truth in the label of "psychology pitcher" that the Detroit players have tacked on Wells.

While there is nothing of the egotist about Wells, he has supreme confidence in his ability. He works on the theory that every batter who hits him safely is being favored with the break.

As is usually the case, when some pitcher has unusual success, the cry invariably goes up that he is a nothing pitcher and no one understands how he is getting away with it.

I have heard those remarks in connection with Wells. Rival batters, however, are making the mistake of underestimating the fast ball he uses.

There is a hop on the fast one as dished up by Wells that has a tendency to make the batter hit under it. That is one reason why the batters cuss as they pop up.

### What is a Real Tire Test?



Among the searching tests made on United States Tires is the "Tread Wear Test" which duplicates in a few days the effect of many months of service.

### Questions and Answers that may be News to You—by a Tire Engineer of the United States Rubber Company

Question—With 20,000,000 cars running in America, does not the experience of users largely take the place of factory tests?

Answer—On the contrary. The very fact that motor transportation is so important in the life of every one imposes an additional obligation for searching tests on the tire manufacturer. The makers of United States Tires do not expect their customers to test their tires for them.

Question—What does the United States Rubber Company Factory Test include?

Answer—Everything from the Tree to the finished Tire. Raw materials are tested before they go into the tires, and the finished tires are tested in the Company's laboratories and on the Company's road test cars, trucks and buses. They are also watched in actual commercial service.

Question—What do these tests prove?

Answer—The material tests insure the quality of material used. The laboratory and road tests of complete tires "prove up" the correctness of manufacturing processes.

Question—What raw materials are tested?

Answer—Cotton cord, which furnishes the strength and flexibility of the tire; rubber, which binds the various parts of the tire together and forms the tread or wearing surface; compounding ingredients, which we mix with the rubber to give it the necessary qualities; and, steel wire, which is used in making the beads of the tire.

Question—What tests are made on the cord?

Answer—Cord going into the manufacture of Web Cord for United States Tires is tested for strength, stretch, size, twist, ply, length of staple, and freedom from imperfections.

Question—What tests are made on Rubber?

Answer—Even though the quality and uniformity of Sprayed Rubber is controlled by the processes used on our plantations in the Far East, every shipment received at our factories is again tested for uniformity and also, after mixing with sulphur, it is tested for its rate of vulcanization, its tensile strength and stretch.

Question—What tests are made of compounding ingredients?

Answer—Compounding ingredients are tested to determine their purity and uniformity. They are practically all in powder form and even the degree of fineness to which they have been ground is tested.

Question—What tests are made on Steel Wire?

Answer—Steel wire is given a chemical analysis to determine whether it meets our specifications, and it is also tested for tensile strength and elongation.

Question—Are United States Tires tested alongside of other makes?

Answer—Yes. These tests are conducted daily in our laboratories and on our road test vehicles.

Question—What is the object of these competitive tests?

Answer—To maintain the superiority of our design and construction.

Question—Does the fact that a large number of tires of a certain design and construction have given satisfactory service obviate the necessity for further tests on tires of the same kind?

Answer—No. Vehicle design and use, and road conditions are constantly changing. Tires that gave excellent satisfaction ten years ago are obsolete today in design and construction.

Question—How does the United States Rubber Company keep abreast of these constantly changing conditions?

Answer—It has a corps of factory trained technical experts in different sections of the country, continually checking the service our tires are rendering under actual operating conditions.

Question—Do all companies test their tires in this way?
