STOCKS STAGE BIG COMEBACK

NEW YORK, June 30. (AP)—Returning confidence in the financial and industrial outlook contributed to the unusual strength of today's stock market which forced ahead under the impressive leadership of U. S. Steel and General Motors.

White prospects of more liberal dividends supplied the incentive for accumulation of the premier industrial issue and leading motor stocks, a no less important factor, in the phenomenal rise today, was the announcement that steel production in the first half of the year had set a new record, with prospects that the 1926 output would exceed that of 1925. Mill operations for the next sixty days, iron age reported, were likely to be maintained at a rate substantially above the July-August average for the past three years—testifying to the unusual summer prosperity of this basic industry.

The closing was strong. Total sales approximated 1,500,000 shares.

Deputy Sheriff Finds Jail Delivery Plot

PENDLETON, June 29. (AP)—A jail delivery in the Umatilla county jail was frustrated here yesterday afternoon when Deputy Sheriff S. S. Stokes discovered a hole in the east wall 10 feet from the ground, large enough for a man to crawl through to liberty. Twelve prisoners, with sentences ranging from 20 days to one year, concealed the hole with a blanket and made sufficient noise to prevent officials hearing the work. It is thought that the delivery was to have been made last night. This same side of the jail wall was opened when five convicts escaped several years ago when Sheriff Th Taylor was killed.

Various Factors Cause Wheat Market Rallies

CHICAGO, June 30. (AP)—Active buying based on dry weather, high temperature and bad crop reports from the northwest rallied the wheat market today from an early decline that was associated with defeat of farm legislation at Washington. Estimates were current that the spring wheat crop this season in the four chief northwestern states would not exceed 175,000,000 bushels and probably would be less. However, favorable weather for the harvest southwest continued and Liverpool quotations were unexpectedly lower.

Wheat closed unsettled at the same as yesterday's finish to 1 1/4 higher; corn 1/4 to 3/4 off; oats 1/4 to 1 1/2 down and provisions 12 to 27c up. Corn and oats finished at new low price records for the season.

AUTHORITIES LOCATE SHACK

LOS ANGELES, June 30 (AP).—Word from Douglas, Ark., authorities as to whether they have been able through the aid of newly-furnished information to locate the desert shack in which Alvin Karpis and George "Burrhead" Barker, the evangelist, says she was held captive by kidnapers, was awaited here today by Herman Chino, chief of Los Angeles detectives.

Chino plans to leave immediately for the border in case the shack is found and has indicated that Mrs. McPherson also would be asked to return to Arizona to identify the building.

The new information, Chino said, was furnished yesterday by L. E. and H. F. Watts, Los Angeles men, who hunted recently in the region where the evangelist was on the Slaughter ranch, east of Douglas.

The Los Angeles Evening Express today published the contents of an unsigned letter addressed to the newspaper in which Angelus temple, the tabernacle of Alvin Karpis and George "Burrhead" Barker, is threatened with destruction.

"Dynamite Dunn Temple," we will dynamite the four-square Dunn temple if you don't put a stop to all the talk going on," the message, published on a piece of legal paper, threatened.

The mention of "four-square" refers to the creed of the Angelus temple pastor.

Clipping Enclosed.
A clipping from a newspaper story tending to discredit Mrs. McPherson's alleged kidnaping was enclosed. The letter was mailed in an envelope bearing the imprint of Ed. W. Hopkins, Los Angeles county assessor, and was mailed under a postoffice permit without a stamp.
