10,000 WORKERS GO ON STRIKE IN NEW YORK TODAY

NEW YORK, July 1. (AP)—Forty thousand union garment workers, who make 75 per cent of all the ready to wear clothes in the United States, went on strike today. Sixteen hundred shops are affected.

The strike demands include wage increases and a minimum of 35 weeks employment throughout the year.

The strike is unique because it is not primarily against employers, but mainly against jobbers who employ no labor directly, but who have garments made for them by sub-manufacturers or contractors employing union operatives.

Suspension Bridge Is Opened to the Public

PHILADELPHIA, July 1. (AP)—A dream of one hundred years came true today when Pennsylvania and New Jersey joined hands in dedicating and formally opening to traffic the greatest suspension bridge in the world.

Since the early days of the nineteenth century the inhabitants of Southern New Jersey and of Philadelphia urged a bridge across the historic Delaware, but a disinclination to go to the great expense always blocked the project. And it was left to a decade when construction costs were never higher to put through the plan and building the great structure.

As it stands, the bridge cost \$37,198,971. Thirteen workmen lost their lives during its construction.

The bridge will be held at Riverside park, July 15.

Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)

Breakfast—Stewed figs with orange, cereal, thin cream, poached eggs on graham toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Vegetable soup, croquettes, bacon and tomato sandwiches, tapioca cream pudding, milk, tea.

Dinner—Hamburg roast, twice baked potatoes, creamed peas with minted carrots, head lettuce salad, green apple pie, bran bread, milk, coffee.

Needless to mention, children under ten years of age will not indulge in the dinner dessert. A stewed fig loaf from breakfast might be combined with some of the tapioca pudding left from luncheon for "junior's" dessert.

The bacon and tomato sandwich is of the open, toasted variety and suitable for children as well as grownups.

It will take 2 quarts of peas in Two cups shelled peas, 1 cup thin white sauce, 2 cups cooked carrots, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 tablespoon minced mint leaves, salt and pepper.

of "Beverly" and a rope with the pod to make 2 cups shelled peas. Cook until tender in as little water as possible. Drain and use the water that drains off in the white sauce. Put carrots, butter and sugar in a sauce pan and shake over a low fire until each slice of carrot is coated with butter and sugar. Then simmer, stirring occasionally with a fork until glazed. Stir in mint. Toss peas in sauce and turn into a hot vegetable dish. Pile carrots in the center, making a border of the peas.

This recipe will serve six or eight persons.
