CUBE PRICES DOWN A CENT

PORTLAND, Ore., July 1. (AP)—Cube prices are lower today on the dairy exchange with firsts down a cent and the rest of the list down a half cent. Board prices: Extras \$7 3/4; standards 26 1/2; prime firsts 25 1/2; firsts 24. The market is weak with print prices unchanged. Top grade eggs are a cent lower in the local market with fresh standard extras posted at 29 cents on the exchange and firsts at 28c. Other grades unchanged.

Australian Wool Clip To Be 2,242,500 Bales

NEW YORK, July 1. (AP)—The coming Australian wool clip has been estimated at 2,242,500 bales, according to a message received by the Australian high commission from the joint conference of wool selling brokers and the Australian wool growers council in Melbourne. An agreement was reached to offer 1,220,000 bales of the new clip for sale before Christmas and the remainder after that time, closing the selling season about March 31, 1927.

Wheat Values Lifted; Market Closes Strong

CHICAGO, July 1. (AP)—Better export demand, unexpected strength at Liverpool and lessened pressure of new wheat southwest together with reports of severe damage from excessively dry weather in parts of the American and Canadian northwest, did much today to lift wheat values. Surprising resistance to the usual effect of profit taking sales development. A trade estimate of 329,000 bushels production for Canada's three provinces attracted notice, being a great deal smaller than last year's harvest. Wheat closed strong, 1 1/2 @ 3c net higher; corn 1/2 @ 1/2c up; oats showing 1/2 @ 1/2c in advance and provisions at 20 @ 50c.
