Sister Mary Says:

Breakfast—Cherries, cereal, thin cream, crisp rye toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Combination omelet, cream sandwiches, puff pudding with strawberry sauce, milk, tea.

Dinner—Fricassee of chicken, boiled rice, fried summer squash, beet and endive salad, vanilla ice cream with fresh apricot sauce, sponge cake, milk, coffee, whole wheat bread.

Junior under 10 years of age should not be permitted to eat the fried summer squash but they are well provided for without it.

The omelet suggested for the luncheon menu makes a very acceptable breakfast dish when a hearty breakfast is needed.

Combination Omelet. Five eggs, 1 cup diced cold boiled potatoes, 1 scant teaspoon onion juice, 3 tablespoons butter, 2 teaspoons minced parsley, 1/2 cup sliced leeks, 3 tablespoons grated cheese, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper.

The white part of the leeks is used. Cut in thin slices and cook in boiling water until tender. Drain. Melt in tablespoon butter in hot frying pan, add potatoes and cook, stirring constantly until potatoes are browned. Remove potatoes and put remaining butter into spider. Beat eggs slightly with salt, pepper and milk. Pour into hot spider and, as the mixture cooks, prick and lift with a fork. When half cooked add potatoes, leeks and parsley. Finish cooking and sprinkle with grated cheese. Fold and turn into a hot platter. (Copyright, 1926, NEA Service, Inc.)

KITTEN BITES; BOY SUFFERS

UNION, July 2. (Special)—The bite of a kitten has resulted in quite a serious illness for Douglas Cheney, second son of Mr. and Mrs. Homer Cheney of Union, the effects proving somewhat similar to those following the bite of a hydrophobic dog, according to Dr. T. M. Gilmore, who has been treating the patient.

The boy had been doing chores on the Arch Spain ranch near Telocaset while Mr. Spain and his son were employed on the new logging railroad being constructed by the Grande Rando Lumber company southeast of Telocaset. When he went to open a gate through which cows were to pass, he first picked up the kitten to remove it from the path, and the junior feline quickly snapped, sinking its sharp little teeth deep into the flesh of a finger on the lad's right hand. It being a hot day Mr. Spain warned the boy about possible infection, but antidotes were not administered until the boy retired for the night. At that time infection had set in the glands in the armpit and young Cheney began to feel ill.

He returned home here next morning and his mother, believing he was suffering from tick bite, rushed him to the physician, who at once noted the infection. The boy has been confined to his home for nearly two weeks, yesterday being the first day when he was permitted to take part in any activities, when he went fishing. He is showing marked improvement, though the infected armpit glands have had to be lanced several times, healing being very slow. The bitten finger and the hand showed no swelling at any time, though the patient was nauseated much of the time.

Portland Voters for New Financial Measure

PORTLAND, Ore., July 2. (AP)—Portland voters approved by a large majority the financial measure providing funds for operation of the city government and calling for the city's financial program to be placed on a cash basis within ten years, in the special election yesterday.

The complete vote for the city's 486 precincts gave, yes 26,094, no 12,827 a majority of 7,267.

GRAND JURY TO TAKE CASE

LOS ANGELES, July 2. (AP)—A grand jury investigation of her abduction story instead of a wide-spread demonstrative theory of 50,000 persons which greeted her a week ago, awaits Almore Sempie McPherson on her return here today from Douglas, Ariz.

The crux in the evangelist's mysterious case was reached yesterday when post office inspectors revealed that a letter carrying what was designed to be substantial proof that the pastor was still alive, had been tampered with in an apparent attempt to cover up the fact that the communication was delivered before and not after thousands of dollars in donations and pledges had been made at a memorial service for the then missing religious leader.

The Angeles Temple congregation still thought at the time of the service that their leader had gone to her death May 18, the victim of the surf at Ocean Park.

Closely following the postal office's revelation, the county grand jury called before it Herman Cline, chief of Los Angeles detectives, Jon Ryan, deputy district attorney, who

have been working on the case, and District Attorney Asa Keyes. Their appearance was followed by the announcement that the inquisitorial body was going to make a complete investigation of all phases of the case. "The grand jury desires to be satisfied that the public may be given the facts to which they are entitled," said William H. Carter, foreman of the jury. "The grand jury wants the most exhaustive investigation and a full report which will be made when the investigation is completed."

HEREDITY THEME OF TALK BY PHY AT HOT LAKE, ORE.

HOT LAKE, (Special)—Something of the purposes and accomplishments of the Oregon eugenics board was told patients and employees at the Hot Lake sanatorium last night by Dr. W. T. Phy, who is president of that organization as well as of the state board of health.

That more than \$600,000 has been saved Oregon through the work of the board, which has enabled feeble minded individuals to return, with safety, to their homes, was one of Dr. Phy's revelations. Other figures showed that, since the pioneer emigration to Oregon, 144 progeny of one of the early settlers whose mental condition was not stable have been dependent on the state in various institutions, while it is not known

how many others have been weak links in their community life.

"The study of heredity is the keynote to the control and improvement of humanity," declared Dr. Phy. "It is possible to improve the human race by a practice of this knowledge even as it has been possible to breed a fine and specialized type of milk cattle from
