GOOD WEATHER SLUMPS WHEAT

CHICAGO, July 2. (AP)—Re-ports of larger offerings of wheat in the southwest, together with better weather northwest, gave the wheat market today a general downward trend. Crop movements however, from the spring wheat belt were mostly bullish, and in-cluded mention of black rust. Rain northward were said to have come too late in many places, espe-cially sections of South Dakota. Wheat closed $\frac{1}{2}$ ¢ to $\frac{1}{4}$ ¢ net lower; corn $\frac{1}{2}$ ¢ to $\frac{1}{4}$ ¢ up; oats shade to $\frac{1}{4}$ ¢ gain and provisions, varying from 10¢ decline to 20¢ advance.

Skyward Movement of Stock Prices Retarded

NEW YORK, July 2. (AP)—The upward movement of stock prices was retarded somewhat today as speculative commitments were evened up in advance of the triple holiday. Bullish demonstrations however developed at intervals with intervals centered on another vigorous rally in U. S. Steel to 144½, the highest price ever re-corded.

Predictions of a favorable un-fitted tonnage statement by the steel corporation next week supplied the incentive for renewed accumula-tion of the stock.

The closing was firm. Total sales approximated 1,400,000 shares.

GRANGE HALL, July 2. (Spe-cial)—J. E. Reynolds, E. E. Grant and Peabody brothers sold their wool last week to Harry Wagner, of the Portland Hide and Wool company, receiving 28 cents a pound.

Mr. Reynolds has contracted his lambs to Cooper Brothers of Wel-sar, Idaho for 10½ cents a pound. They will be delivered the last of this month and the first of next.

State Forester Gives Vacationists Warning

SALEM, Ore., July 2. (AP)—I wish to call the attention of the public to the fact that it is a mis-de-monor to throw any lighted fire crackers on any forest land, road, highway or railroad right of way within the state of Oregon," says State Forester F. A. Elliott in a statement issued yesterday. "Nor does the law apply to firecrackers alone. It applies to any lighted material."

"Additional patrols are to be placed along highways and at places where vacationists congre-gate, and those men have been given explicit instruction to ar-rest all violators of the forest fire laws."

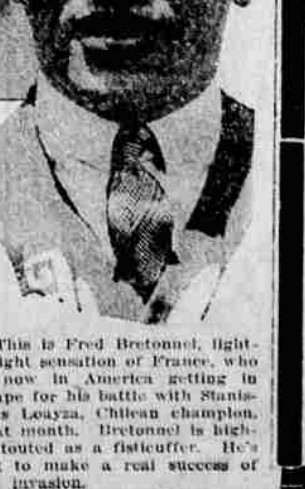
COMMITTEE SUICIDE

Trading Is Generally Steady in Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., July 2. (AP)—Butter and egg quotations are unchanged on the local dairy board. Trading is generally steady at ruling values. Receipts of surplus cubes from country creameries yesterday amounted to 22,063 pounds with the local make reported at 22,080 pounds. Egg receipts were 1281 cases. Storage stocks of butter increased 740 pounds and eggs 246 cases bringing local storage holdings up to 607,797 pounds and 52,238 cases respectively.

Country dressed meats and poultry were also steady and unchanged.

"The demand for wool has slack-ened somewhat this week ending three weeks of fair business dur-ing which prices have been moved up somewhat and by their advance have tended to halt business. The week closes with prices firm at the advance."

"The new clip is being rapidly cleared especially in the far west. The foreign markets are firm, especially for fine wools, the last Australian sale of the season at Brisbane closing with prices well maintained."

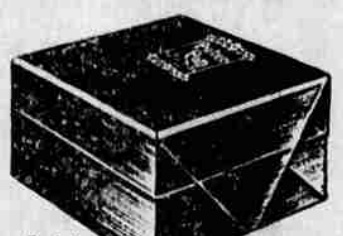
