Dear Editor:

In your issue of June 23d a small item appeared which is rather misleading. It is the notice of a meeting of farmers held at Island City last Tuesday evening.

This item mentioned my calling such a meeting for the purpose of moving the present cheese factory from Union to Island City.

Now this was not the intention of any one interested so far as I know, to be sure there is a small factory at Union which I understand can be purchased, but the real cause of the meeting being held was for the purpose of looking into the widely felt and often expressed sentiment that the dairy farmer of this section is not getting what he should have for his cream and especially the small dairymen.

Last spring Mr. Catterlin rented

ed the Union cheese factory and a good number of us saw it to send our milk to him. He is an old experienced cheese maker of Tillamook and Coos counties and helped organize the first cooperative cheese factory in that section. He proved his worth to us by making as fine a quality of cheese as can be bought anywhere.

Those of us, whose business it was to look into the affairs of the factory, can see very plainly that although he was paying around 50 cents for our butterfat, yet such a plant could be a profitable business if well managed and backed by sufficient money.

A good many dairymen were talked to who all expressed themselves as being interested in seeing a move made to organize a factory on a strictly cooperative basis and all of them felt that Island City would be the best location on account of the five good roads all graveled or paved leading into it. Its nearness to La Grande was considered and the fact that taxes here would be far less than in the larger place.

It was felt by those who investigated the matter closely that a combination factory, making cheese, butter and cottage cheese would balance up the business and make the most profit for the farmers.

Butter made from sweet milk delivered early each morning to the factory would undoubtedly take a first place on the market, and cottage cheese which is so popular now, but has to be shipped from the western part of the state should be a profitable product of such a factory. Cheese of the quality made at the Union factory has already won its place in this territory.

This combination backed by the patrons with all the profits going back into their pockets should demand the patronage of the business houses of this section if its product should be in all ways equal or better than products from similar factories.

Our La Grande chamber of commerce at a meeting about three weeks ago spent the entire time discussing cooperation and went on record as being strongly in favor of it.

The president of the Payette Cooperative creameries spoke at the grange picnic last Saturday and brought out the fact that dairymen are paying a tax of about \$20 a cow per year by selling to private creameries instead of those run cooperatively.

A well managed cooperative factory situated at Island City would be the means of realizing the small farm movement and local cooperation so emphasized by the land settlement committee who have just visited us.

Now I had no wish to take any leading part in this movement, more than to learn all I could about the matter and be of any service possible.

and there being no organized leadership appointed, I was asked to send out notices to those who had expressed a desire for such a meeting.

Mr. Catterlin's proof of his cheese making ability at Union has of course given his patrons a great deal of confidence in him, and I believe that a great deal of the success of a factory would depend upon the employment of a man of so much experience and skill in his line.

He has offered to sign a contract to work in the proposed factory, if it should be started, for \$5 a day for a period of two years and to allow one-half of his first year's salary to stand as a guarantee that his products will be first class in every respect. Can anyone claim that this is trying to promote any one's private interests?

VISITS AT HOT LAKE

Farm Pointers

Spraying early to get the first "nest egg" aphids on Oregon garden crops such as beans and cabbage, is the way to the easiest and best control. As the bean vines expand and grow luxuriant leaves the hiding and feeding places become larger and harder to get at, and the insects multiply with amazing rapidity when once thoroughly established. Nicotine dusts at frequent intervals are recommended by the experiment station.

Carbon bisulfide for control of such Oregon pests as ants, root maggots and white grubs is recommended for soil sterilization by the experiment station. One or two holes 4 to 12 inches deep according to size of plant are made about 4 inches from the plant and filled with a teaspoon to a tablespoon of carbon bisulfide. The holes are closed immediately by tamping the soil with the feet.

Western potato flea beetles will be numerous again this summer, and they are one of the worst insect pests of potatoes and tomatoes in Oregon. The beetles eat small irregular holes in the leaves. These holes are not very harmful, but fungus becomes established in them and spreads over the leaf. The larva tunnels into the developing tubers underground, giving a roughened, pimply appearance which affects their market value. The beetles feed on a large variety of plants but do the most damage
