MEANWELL TO OPEN SCHOOL

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, July 2. (Special to The Observer).—Dr. Walter E. Meanwell, head basketball coach at the University of Wisconsin, considered the outstanding authority on the hoop game, will open a two week course in basketball coaching here Monday. Although a legal holiday, Dr. Meanwell asked to have his course open Monday as he wishes his students to receive the benefit of two full weeks of instruction and he can not stay over after July 18, as he has another contract to fulfill.

Dr. Meanwell's course will be supplemented with a two-hour course in track, coaching by Bill Hayward's instruction, as that by Hayward's instruction as that by Dr. Meanwell and other coaches, will consist of both theory and practical demonstration.

Originated Short Pass.

Dr. Meanwell is the originator of the pivot, short pass, and the five-man style of play. His teams at Wisconsin have won more Western conference championships than all the other Big Ten quintets combined.

Hayward has been at Oregon 24 years. In that time he has won 11 Northwest conference championships and one Pacific Coast conference title. Three times he has assisted in coaching the American Olympic teams and has been involved to join the 1924 coaching staff. Dan Kelly, the first athlete to break the 100-yard dash record at 9 3-4 seconds, is an ex-pupil of Bill Hayward.

McEwan Plans School.

Captain John J. McEwan, into coach of the Army eleven, will open a two week course in football coaching July 19. Captain McEwan recently signed a five year contract to coach Oregon. He coached the West Point team three years, and before that was for five years head line coach. While a member of the West Point eleven,

he was picked on Walter Camp's all American team. Last year the Army team administered a sound thrashing to Knute Rockne's Notre Dame eleven, 27 to 6, and in the final game of the season repulsed the Navy, traditional foe, 10 to 0.

Captain McEwan's course will be supplemented by a course in baseball coaching by Virgil D. Earl, director of athletics at Oregon. Earl played four years at Oregon, and in his last year was catcher and coach. He formerly coached the Washington high baseball and football teams and won several championships in each sport.

It has been found, it was said, that beneficial results were obtained by permitting malarial mosquitoes to sting general paralysis patients.

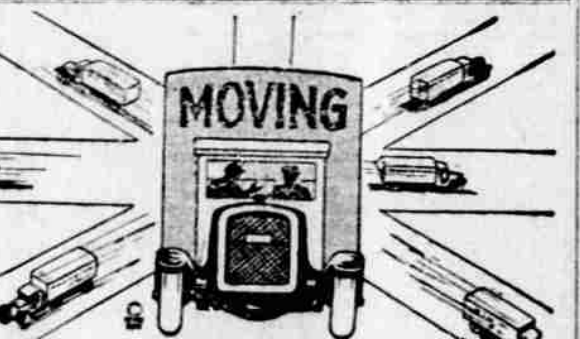
