Churches Take Note of Fourth

Sermons in La Grande Tomorrow Will Honor Birthday of Nation 150 Years Ago.

One hundred fifty years ago tomorrow, the declaration of American independence was signed. The sesquicentennial anniversary, coming on Sunday, brings with it a reminder that fathers of the nation were a godfearing, churchgoing people. La Grande churches will join with those of the nation tomorrow in commemoration of their patriotism.

At a joint congregation of Baptists and Presbyterians at the Baptist auditorium in the morning, the Rev. William Crosby Ross will deliver a message in keeping with the day. Special music will be of patriotic nature.

The service is first of the series in which the two parishes will unite during the absence of one of their pastors. All during July, while the Rev. George Albert Pollard is on vacation, the morning worship meetings will be held at the Baptist church under Mr. Ross' direction. When Mr. Ross leaves in August, Mr. Pollard will have charge of the joint services in the Presbyterian church.

Sunday school will be at 9:45 a. m. in both churches.

L. C. Harper will deliver the morning sermon at the 11 o'clock service, the pastor, the Rev. C. V. Dunn, being absent to attend the state convention. Sunday school as usual will be at 9:45 a. m. O. C. Pleshman will lead the men's class.

The morning message July 11 will be by J. J. Hawley. The pastor expects to be home for the following Sunday, when he will tell the story of the convention.

Hall, pastor of the Methodist church south, in announcing his program for the Fourth of July. "He raised up great men like Franklin, Jefferson, Henry, Marshall, Adams, Washington, Lincoln and others. Mr. Hall's subject in the morning will be "A Good Man's Lives in View of the Mysteries of Life." The scripture text is found in Daniel, XII:13-12.
