milk, coffee. — Codfish puffballs, sliced tomatoes, toasted muffins, prune whip, milk, tea.

Dinner — Baked veal balls, mashed potatoes, new onions in cream, vegetable relish in lemon shells, whole wheat bread, raspberry charlotte, milk, coffee.

The veal balls are served with a rich white sauce. A cheap cut of meat can be used, since the meat must be put through the food chopper several times. One-half cup of dried bread crumbs are added to one pound of ground veal and the mixture made moist with melted butter and milk. This vegetable relish is as good with fish as with veal.

Vegetable Methods
Two cups minced new cabbage, 1/4 cup grated raw carrot, 1 green sweet pepper, one half cup minced celery, 1 tablespoon sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, one half cup scalding vinegar, 4 tablespoons lemon juice.

Combine vegetables with salt, pepper and sugar. Pour over vinegar, cover and let stand until cold. Add lemon juice and chill. Serve in halves of lemon shells.
