He gave the following literal translation of some of the markings: "He cannot own man speak. Date 1010. Twenty four men. Twelve killed. Six went away."

Pictures Described Pictures of seven women, one carrying a baby, prone upon the lava surface. Another picture shows the woman with the baby being hurled from the cliff. Other marking tell of the capture by Indians and of the burial of those killed by six of the Norwegians. Prof. Opson came to the United States from Norway more than thirty years ago and since that time has devoted most of his time to the study of runes. Before going to Norway he served five years in the Swedish army, being a member of the King's guard. He tells of firing a rifle salute of 81 shots when Crown Prince Gustaf Adolf of Sweden who is now visiting this country, was born.

Defies Doubters Answering statements of doubt as to his finding of Norse ruins on a rock north of here last Monday, Irving Johnson today issued an urgent invitation to scientists to visit the rock and make their own interpretations of the inscriptions. His invitation followed a statement from Dr. Herbert J. Spinden, director of Mexican archeology and ethnology at the Peabody museum, Harvard university, in which he doubted the authenticity of the inscriptions.

Typing Mistake Halts The March of Justice PORTLAND, Ore., July 7. (AP)—Because a typewriter key struck "g" instead of "t" several hours of valuable court and grand jury time and expense went for naught in federal court here today. Even the jury was ready to be sworn before Judge Charles E. Wolverton to try Charles E. Sparhawk, indicted for Mann act violation, for bringing Mildred Gregg, alias Mildred Clark from Spokane to Portland on December 18, 1925 instead of 1925. While the defense objected the court ruled the jury was not impeded because it was not yet sworn, and ordered the indictment turned back to the grand jury which meets July 19 and the case set for trial July 20.

Rain Drenches Fires; Hail Fatal to Chicks KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., July 7. (AP)—A rain and hail storm which swept this section yesterday and last night dispensed mixed blessings. It aided in quelling forest fires which have been burning for more than two weeks and in one section ballistics killed more than 700 purchased chickens on the Kesler ranch. The storm assumed the proportions of cloudburst in some sections, doing no damage, however.

MRS. JACKSON MEDICAL SPRINGS, Ore. (Special)—Sarah Jane Wanker was born in Skoto county, Ohio, July 11, 1858 and died July 4 in the St. Elizabeth hospital in Baker. At the age of 17, September 11, 1875, she was united in marriage to J. A. Jackson, five children being born to this union—Ellis, Henry, Maude, Herbert, all of Columbus, Ohio; and one boy who died at the age of 14 months. Ten grandchildren and three great grandchildren also survive her.

Mr. and Mrs. Jackson came to Medical Springs April 2, 1924, to make their home with her brother, J. H. Wanker, and had been here only a short time when it was necessary to take her to Baker for treatment. She was a member of the Christian church and also affiliated with the Hebrew lodge of Columbus, Ohio. Her husband left Tuesday evening for their home in Ohio where the funeral services will be held next Sunday. Her death brought to an end 50 years of wedded life.

CHRISTIAN LUND. Christian Lund, who for many years was proprietor of Lund's Grocery on North Second street, is dead here. Funeral arrangements have not yet been completed. The body is at Snodgrass and Zimmerman's undertaking parlors. The decedent was born in Denmark in 1862 and came to Mantli, Utah in 1866 with his parents. He was married to Emma Dorothea Peterson in Salt Lake City in 1884 and Mr. and Mrs. Lund moved to Oregon in 1899, first settling at Cove and then coming to La Grande four years later where they have resided since. Mr. Lund is survived by his
