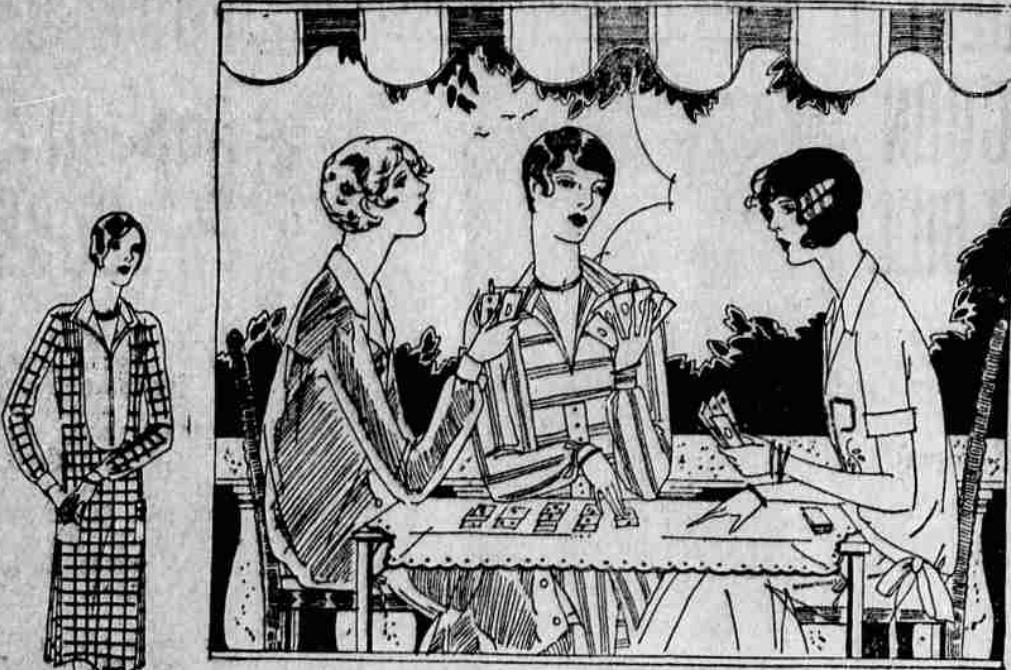

STOCKTON, July 8. (AP)—Ray McCart, captain of the Oregon Agricultural college varsity eleven in 1924, has been appointed coach at the College of the Pacific here for the season of 1926-27. McCart, who played halfback in college, will assist head Coach "Swede" Highter with the Pacific varsity eleven and handle the freshman basketball team for the Tigers. He will also be in charge of the baseball squad. The new mentor has had one year of experience as high school coach and he is now attending football coaching school at University of California.

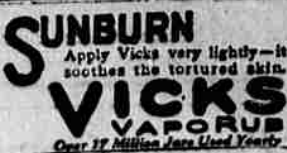

SPORT NEWS

FIDEL LA BARBA DEFENDS TITLE

LOS ANGELES, July 8. (AP)—Fidel LaBarba, king of the fly-weight boxers, today was among the battle thinned ranks of title-holder who in the year of ups and downs in championship row have reputedly successfully the fighting bids of their challengers.

In a fast and furious ten round battle here last night the champion, defending his throne for the first time since ascending it last August, took a referee's decision over George Rivers Perea, familiarly known to boxing followers as George Rivers, of San Francisco and Los Angeles.

Mexican Outclassed.
As he twice before had done LaBarba outclassed the little Mexican boxer, but his victory this time, it was the consensus of opinion was far more sensational than the others. Hippodrome gave the crown wearer at least six rounds and his challenger anything from one to three, with the rest even.

To those who had seen LaBarba in his previous fights, the battle he waged last night came as a surprise for he discarded the defensive tactics he usually employed and fought a purely offensive fight throughout, and won a ripping attack of lefts and rights to Rivers' body and head.

The title aspirant, too fought a remarkable battle but he was unable to do much at long range scoring his greatest in the clinch. His jarring rights and lefts often shook the champion.

8000 Saw Battle.
In the absence of an official count, it was estimated that between 7500 and 8000 fans saw the title scrap. The champion was guaranteed 47 1/2 per cent of the total receipts which were estimated at \$22,000. As the challenger, Rivers was to get 15 per cent.

Last December they met again, Berlenbach winning on points after Delaney had all but duplicated his 1924 triumph. Delaney stands a good chance of depriving Paul of his laurels this time; in fact, such a feat wouldn't cause any great surprise.
